Based on the available information, the house at 130 East Main Street appears to be eligible for the National Register as a contributing resource in the National Register eligible Hancock Historic District. The two story, three bay, frame house is located within the Hancock Survey District (WA-IV-040), a National Register eligible historic district. The property at 130 East Main Street (WA-HAN-024) is typical of the early 20th century frame houses which were constructed during a period of rapid growth in Hancock and was identified as a contributing resource in the survey. It contributes to the streetscape and is related to the neighboring houses in terms of design, location, massing, setback and materials.

Description


This is a two-and-a-half story frame house with a gable roof covered with three-tab asphalt shingles. Across the front is a raised shed roofed porch. The house has the original beveled siding and is sitting on a rubble stone foundation. This house is typical of the frame houses of the early 20th century during a period of fast growth in Hancock.


