DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This farm complex known as Abraham Eshleman's "home farm" is located north of Reid Road about one half mile west of Paradise Church Road west of Reid in Washington County, Maryland. The house is situated on a slight hill and faces east.

The house is a two story, four bay brick structure resting on roughly coursed stone foundations which become a full story in height at the front elevation. The two southern bays of the front elevation are recessed beneath a double porch.

Bricks forming the walls are laid in American or common bond at all elevations with, generally, seven courses of stretcher bricks between rows of headers.

Windows and doors have narrow frames finished with a bead at the inside edge. Wide wooden lintels are present above the openings. Most main story windows are flanked with pairs of three panel shutters. Other windows have pintles indicating that shutters were present at one time. Most windows have six over six pane double hung sashes.

The main entrance in the front elevation is located within the enclosed double porch. The porch is entered ~~by~~^{through} the south end wall which has a six panel door hung beneath a narrow transom.

The roof is covered with sheet metal and terminates with barge boards set directly against the end walls. Small brick chimneys are located inside each gable end.

North of the house is a frame bank barn and other buildings related to agricultural use.

The structures appear to be in good condition and stand on a tract containing 52.66 acres, part of the land grants, "Nicholas' Contrivance" and "All I could Get."

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This farm group consisting of a brick house, frame bank barn and related buildings offers an example of a prominent type of mid 19th century rural architecture in Washington County and the Cumberland Valley. The house has several characteristics, such as the recessed double porch in part of the front wall, the use of American bond at the front elevation and the type of exterior woodwork, which have been associated with mid 19th century construction in the area.

Deeds to this property refer to it as Abraham Eshleman's "Home Farm." At his death in 1902, Abraham Eshleman's will stated that this 52 1/2 acre farm could be purchased by his grandson A. Clinton Martin at the rate of \$75. per acre, (Will Liber J/108). Martin purchased the farm in 1902 for \$3949.22. (116/657). In 1961 Mary A. Martin and Aaron D. Martin sold the farm to the present owners.

During the 1850's Abraham purchased several parcels of land, parts of "Nicholas' Contrivance" and "All I Could Get" including a 27 1/2 acre tract from his father, Peter Eshleman who owned a large amount of land near Reid. (IN11/693, IN7/606).
