This frame bank barn is typical of a prominent barn form which presumably originated in Pennsylvania but is found in northern Maryland, northern Virginia, West Virginia and other areas which were settled by people from Pennsylvania. Like other structures following this form, this late 19th century barn has a lower level within the foundations for livestock. This part of the barn is sheltered by a deep overhang or forebay. The upper structure, reached by an earthen ramp at the rear of the barn, is used for storage. Many barns following this plan are to be found in Washington County. Stone, brick and frame construction were used generally in that chronological order.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Located on the same property as the farm complex discussed in form WA-I-228 is this second group of buildings consisting of a circa 1900 house and this frame bank barn which appears to date from the latter part of the 19th century. They are located on the west side of Oaks Road, just north of Reid Road in Washington County, Maryland.

The barn is a large frame structure resting on coursed fieldstone foundations. Typical of livestock barns in the area, it is built into a bank so that the foundations at the front elevation are a full story in height. At the rear of the barn a dirt ramp gives access to the upper structure or storage area. Like many barns in the region it has an eastern exposure with the front of the exposed foundations protected by a deep overhang of the upper structure, known as a forebay.

The upper part of this barn is sheathed with vertical boards painted red with white trim. Louvered ventilators are set high in the walls, under the eaves and in the gables. The ventilators have applied trim with arched tops. Centered in forebay are two pairs of doors, one above the other. Large doors open onto the barn floor from the rear of the building as well. The southern end of the barn accommodates a wagon shed.

Windows and doors in the ground level display pegged joining. Typically, doors in the section of the barn for livestock are double with independently operated upper and lower leaves.

The roof of the barn is covered with sheet metal.

The structure, in good condition, stands just south of the farm house. According to the owner, the present house replaced an earlier log dwelling on the property.


