DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This house is located on the north side of Mt. Tabor Road, just east of Kaiser Ridge Road, near the Conococheague Creek, west of Hagerstown in Washington County, Maryland. It is situated on an area of high, level ground amid slate hills and faces south.

The structure is a two story, three bay dwelling with a two story, two bay ell extending to the rear or north. The entire structure is sheathed with composition siding. The front section of the house is believed to be of log construction while the ell is a frame addition.

Windows and doors appear to be placed symmetrically in the walls. Windows are relatively large in relation to wall area; those at the first story are quite long. They have two over two pane double hung sashes with plain casing, trimmed with a back band at the top edge.

The main entrance is located in the center bay of the front elevation. The door and transom are trimmed similarly to the windows. A one story entrance porch with a low hipped roof is supported by square posts trimmed with decorative curved brackets. Spanning the east wall of the ell is a two story porch also supported with square wooden posts between which run wooden balustrades.

Sheet metal sheathes the roof and extends beyond the end walls. Molded barge boards and deep returns finish the gables. The only remaining chimney is a concrete block flue at the exterior of the ell.

The house appears to be in good to excellent condition and stands on a lot containing two acres.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This house, a two story three bay log structure with a two story frame addition to the rear provides an example of a typical regional form. Houses of this type, usually dating from the mid to late 19th century, are prominent in the more hilly, wooded sections of Washington County. This house is located among the slate hills through which the Conococheague Creek flows.

The house is believed to have been built by a Samuel Needy. Deed records indicate that Samuel Needy in several transactions between 1860 and 1884 purchased about 50 acres in this vicinity. (I. 578, WMcKK1/81, 75/693, 85/392). The 1860 deed was for about 21 acres which Samuel Needy purchased from David Needy. This land included parts of the land grants "Mt. Hope" and "Volgamots Industry." The property was owned by Samuel Needy until 1914. It has changed hands numerous times during the 20th century.


