This farm, part of the land grant "Hager's Long Hickory," is improved with a large brick house of formal design and a frame gambrel roofed barn. This period of building is indicated by the use of American bond at all elevations, the presence of wide wood lintels above the windows, the entrance treatment and the decorative exterior woodwork.

DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This complex is located at the end of a private lane which extends in an easterly direction from Hopewell Road west of Hagerstown and immediately west of I-81 in Washington County, Maryland. The buildings are situated on an area of high ground with the house facing west and the barn southeast.

The dwelling is a two story, five bay brick structure resting on low fieldstone foundations. It has a hipped roof culminating with a small balustraded deck. A recessed double porch included under the main roof span extends across the three southern bays of the rear or east elevation. This porch is supported by tapered square pillars. Attached to the south end wall is a one story, two bay brick extension which is built to a one and a half story, three bay stone secondary dwelling or outbuilding with chimneys inside each gable end. Next to the stone building is a bake oven.

American or common bond brickwork is used at all elevations. Generally there are six rows of stretcher bricks between courses of headers. The house is wide, the end walls having four bays at the north elevation and three at the south.

Openings appear to be arranged symmetrically in the front elevation. All windows have six over six pane double hung sashes held within narrow casings beneath wide wooden lintels. First windows are flanked with pairs of louvered shutters. The main entrance is centered, in the front elevation. The door has molded trim and is topped with a diamond pane transom. Side-lights flank the door. A flat roofed one story entrance porch shelters the door. It is supported by pairs of small square posts among which run curved trim work. Above is a decorated frieze with brackets matching the frieze on the main structure. A similar porch is located at an entrance in the north end wall.

A prominent feature of the house is the eaves treatment, the ornamented frieze and brackets which extends completely around the building. On the frieze are carved florettes between which are scroll cut brackets. Above, the roof is sheathed with slates. A pair of brick chimneys are located inside the south end wall. A third chimney extends from the interior of the house near its north end.

The barn, located north of the house is a large frame structure with a gambrel roof. Louvered ventilators with applied trim at their tops are spaced at intervals in the walls. Large metal ventilators are attached to each end of the roof ridge.

The buildings appear to be in good condition and are located on a farm containing 123.9 acres, part of the land grant "Hager's Long Hickory."

This period of building is indicated by the use of American bond at all elevations, the presence of wide wood lintels above the windows, the entrance treatment and the decorative exterior woodwork.

During much of the second half of the 19th century this farm was owned by a Daniel Huyett who purchased it in 1861 from Elizabeth Lawrence and W.B. McAtee for \$10,729.68. At that time the property included 307 3/4 acres. (IN15/673).
