**SUMMARY DESCRIPTION**

Williamsport is located in Washington Co. Md. at the confluence of the Potomac River and the Conococheague Creek. Its history and development are closely linked with the river. The district being nominated consists of 341 contributing and 62 non-contributing buildings or sites in the central area of the town where construction generally dates from before the 1930's. A section of the C&O Canal and surrounding river and creek bottom land are integral parts of the district as well. The district is made up mostly of commercial and residential structures dating from the 18th century through the 1930's. Log, brick and frame construction was used primarily. There are only a few stone structures. The buildings are generally vernacular with elements of various styles covering a 150 year span. Most prominently represented are vernacular interpretations of Georgian, Federal and Greek Revival styles along with Italianate commercial and residential buildings. With the exception of N. Artizan St. where late 19th and early 20th century houses are far back from the street on large lots, the district's buildings are generally situated against the street. The streets, particularly Potomac, Salisbury and Conococheague are unusually wide for a small town and are shaded with large old trees.

## SUMMARY STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Williamsport historic district is significant for its contribution to an understanding of mid Maryland architecture, as well as for its historic associations with commerce and transportation, industry and the military. Evolving from a mid 18th century trading settlement at the confluence of the Potomac River and the Conococheague Creek, Williamsport is located where a prominent 18th century highway crosses the Potomac River. Its location has helped the town to become prosperous. Williamsport's architecture reflects this prosperity through time. There are outstanding vernacular examples from the late 18th, 19th and early 20th centuries as well as more pretentions interpretations of the Federal, Italianate, Queen Anne and Colonial Revival styles. Much of Williamsport's architectural significance is derived from the integrity of the early buildings which remain with relatively few alterations. Some of the alterations that do exist, such as early buildings renovated in the late 19th century are of themselves significant as reflecting the growth of the town. The River, the road and later the C&O Canal and the railroads made Williamsport a commercial and transportation center, leading to the development of industries dependent on these systems.

Williamsport as a River crossing place also took on limited significance during the Civil War.

## GENERAL DESCRIPTION

The Williamsport, Md. proposed National Register historic district consists of the central area of the town. It contains 341 contributing buildings in a compact area interrupted by relatively few intrusions. Thirty seven of the resources are outstanding architectural or historical examples. In addition there are 62 non-contributing buildings or sites consisting for the most part of modern single family dwellings or small apartments. They are scattered through the district, but are more concentrated at its edges.

In general the district is made up of a combination of commercial and residential structures dating from the 18th century through the 1930's. Although Williamsport was officially designated as a municipality in 1787, there was an earlier settlement on its site which is a prominent location along the Potomac River and the Conococheague Creek. The Potomac River is important in Williamsport's history, both giving life to its economy and destroying it during flood times. Other significant features are US highway 11 (Potomac St.), the major 18th and 19th century road through the Cumberland and Shenendoah Valleys; the C&O Canal; and the Western Maryland and Cumberland Valley Railroads. These transportation routes contributed in a major way to Williamsport's growth and development and its character.

Almost 20% of the buildings within the district date from the late 18th and early 19th centuries. They are generally of log or brick construction, but a few are stone. There are several excellent vernacular interpretations of the Federal style. It is also noteworthy that there are a substantial number of early brick buildings, since brick was not a typical construction material in the area until the second quarter of

nineteenth century. Slightly less than 60% of the buildings date from the late 19th and early 20th centuries. Of particular interest are a series of Italianate commercial/residential buildings with original store fronts along Conococheague St.

Building materials are divided almost equally in the district among log, brick and frame. There are surprisingly few stone structures, only 11, and four of those date from the 20th century. The lack of stone buildings is odd because Williamsport lies in the heart of a limestone region where stone construction was prominent at an early date.

The district is adjacent to the C&O Canal National Park and a few structures owned by the National Park Service have been included in the district along with a section of the Canal and open space around it.

Williamsports streetscapes reveal a variety of stylistic influences spanning 150 years. The streets, particularly Potomac, Salisbury and Conococheague are unusually wide for a small town and are marked with large old trees. The town suggests a mood of solidarity and quiet prosperity.

## GENERAL STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE, ADDITIONAL INFORMATION

Although a settlement was present at the site of Williamsport as early as the mid 18th century, the town was not formally created until 1787. It became incorporated in 1823. It was located at a ferry crossing of the Potomac River and on a major north-south highway from Harris' Ferry (Harrisburg) in Pennsylvania to the Potomac. This route was used by pioneers who settled the upper Shenandoah Valley and the Great Valley of Virginia. Prominent influences in the town were the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal which operated for nearly a century from after 1828 to 1924. Williamsport was a major stopping point on the Canal between Georgetown, now part of the District of Columbia to the east and Cumberland in western Maryland.

The railroad was also an important influence in Williamsport.

The Western Maryland Railroad ran along the north side of the Potomac River and the Cumberland Valley Railroad had its southern terminus at Williamsport.

Williamsport's transportation advantages: the highway, railroad and canal led to significant early industries including a tannery established in 1842, lumber and coal dealing, and brickyards. The W.D. Byron Tannery still in operation today began in 1897, just north of the town limits. The Cushwa Brick Co. was founded in 1896 and remains a thriving business. It, too, is located just north of the town.

Architecturally Williamsport contains significant examples illustrating its early development as a settlement along a major pioneer route to the Appalachian South and as a River town. Later as the C&O Canal and railroads led to a boom period there was additional growth resulting in prominent late 19th century Italianate and Queen Anne buildings for residential and commercial purposes and renovation of

some older structures.

The Civil War had an impact on Williamsport as it did upon many towns in the border area. Union troops from Maryland and Massachusetts were stationed at Williamsport during the early part of the War to guard the Potomac River crossing. In June of 1863, Lee's Army crossed the Potomac here enroute to Gettysburg, Pennsylvania.

Historically, Williamsport is noteworthy as having been considered, if somewhat casually, as the possible site of the nation's capitol. George Washington visited the town in 1791 and its potential as a capitol city was discussed.

Williamsport continues to thrive today. The growth center has moved to an industrial park just east of town and now residential areas have developed to the south and east. Thus the old town center is not threatened at this time with any major new intrusive elements.

This nomination follows the course of the present town boundaries at the west along the Potomac River, northwest, along the Conococheague Creek, following the north boundary, just north of U.S. Route 11, to Apple Tree Lane; then following Apple Tree Lane in a southeasterly direction to U.S. Route 11; thus following the north side of U.S. Route 11 in a southwesterly direction to a point opposite the easternmost boundary of the Williamsport Park, then following the outline of Williamsport Park along the property of G. Harriet Downey, to a point on the north side of Sunset Avenue east of Artizan Street, then west to Artizan Street; the north along the east side of Artizan Street to an alley south of East Frederick Street; then west along the north side of the alley to South Conococheague Street, then north along the east side of South Conococheague Street to Frederick Street, then west along the north side of West Frederick Street to Vermont Street; from the east side of Vermont Street, southwest to the east property line to the east boundary line of George W. Groff, Jr.; then following this property line and the adjoining lot in a southerly direction to the south property line of Kenneth R. Shank; then following the said south boundary line to Main Street; then north along the east side of Main Street and Canal Street; then west along the north side of Canal Street in a straight line to intersect with the western boundary of the town of Williamsport.

## BOUNDARY JUSTIFICATION

Williamsport's historic district for purposes of the National Register nomination includes all areas of the town with pre-1930's construction. These older parts are actually the greater portion of the town including Potomac, Salisbury, Church and Frederick Streets, the major east-west thorofares and Conococheague, Vermont and Artizan Streets which run north-south. The district's boundaries are natural ones on the west and north, the Potomac River and the Conococheague Creek respectively. On the east and south boundaries mark the division between older areas of the town and sections consisting almost entirely of new construction. Open space along the C&O Canal, Potomac River and the Conococheague Creek has been included because it is historically part of the town and because it helps to convey the town's relationship to the environment which shaped its development.

- WA-WIL-001 - 128-126 South Conococheague Street  
Multipart two story balloon frame house covered with asbestos shingle siding. Dates from the late 19th century.
- WA-WIL-002 - 124 South Conococheague Street  
Frame two story, three bay townhouse covered with asbestos shingle siding and dating from the late 19th century.
- WA-WIL-003 - 122 South Conococheague Street  
German sided two story, three bay frame house dating from the late 19th century.
- WA-WIL-004 - 120 South Conococheague Street  
Aluminum sided two story, four bay house, probably of log construction, dating apparently from the mid 19th century.
- WA-WIL-005 - 116 South Conococheague Street  
A one and a half story, three bay German sided house probably of log construction. It would appear to date from the mid 19th century.
- WA-WIL-006 - 114 South Conococheague Street  
Probably of log construction, this is a two story, three bay house covered with asbestos shingle siding. Exterior features suggest a late 19th century building date.
- WA-WIL-007 - 112 South Conococheague Street  
Two story, three bay dwelling of frame construction covered with asbestos shingle siding. It probably dates from the early 20th century.
- WA-WIL-008 - 106 South Conococheague Street  
Two story, three bay log house sheathed with German siding, probably dating from the mid 19th century.
- WA-WIL-009 - 102 South Conococheague Street  
Two story, three bay frame house with a storefront. It is covered with aluminum siding and dates from the late 19th century.
- WA-WIL-010 - 30 South Conococheague Street  
Late 19th century brick structure, gable front with three bays at the first story.
- WA-WIL-011 - 28-26 South Conococheague Street  
A six bay, one story building of possible log construction. It apparently dates from the early 19th century.

- WA-WIL-012 - 24 South Conococheague Street  
Three bay, one story log structure covered with German siding at the front elevation. Probably dates from the early 19th century.
- WA-WIL-013 - 22 South Conococheague Street  
Mid-late 19th century brick house, two story, three bays.
- WA-WIL-014 - 18 South Conococheague Street  
Two story, three bay brick house. Possibly a one story building raised in height.
- \* WA-WIL-015 - 14 South Conococheague Street  
Mid 19th century two story, five bay brick house with a Flemish bond facade and a central entrance.
- WA-WIL-016 - 10 South Conococheague Street  
Two story, five bay painted brick house dating from the third quarter of the 19th century. Extensively altered.
- WA-WIL-017 - 2-6 South Conococheague Street  
Brick commercial/residential painted brick structure with two stories and seven bays. Late 19th century.
- WA-WIL-018 - 2 North Conococheague Street  
Williamsport City Hall. Two story, five bay stone Georgian Revival style structure. Early 20th century.
- \* WA-WIL-019 - 10 North Conococheague Street  
Two story, five bay painted brick house with a central entrance. Second quarter of the 19th century.
- \* WA-WIL-020 - 12 North Conococheague Street  
Late 19th century two story, three bay brick commercial/residential building containing an original storefront.
- \* WA-WIL-021 - 14 North Conococheague Street  
Two and one half story, four bay painted brick house with mansard. Late 19th century.
- WA-WIL-022 - 16 North Conococheague Street  
Commercial/residential two story, five bay painted brick building with a ca. 1900 storefront. Extensively altered.
- WA-WIL-023 - 22 North Conococheague Street  
Brick House, now a commercial building with mansard. It is a two and one half story, three bay Second Empire Style building. Extensively altered.
- WA-WIL-024 - 28 North Conococheague Street  
Early 20th century commercial style brick building.
- \* WA-WIL-025 - 30-32 North Conococheague Street  
Part of a row of three story painted brick late 19th century Italianate commercial/residential structures. Original store fronts.

- \* WA-WIL-026 - 36-38 North Conococheague Street  
Central section of a late 19th century painted brick Italianate commercial/residential row. Three stories, three bays with original storefront.
- \* WA-WIL-027 - 40-42 North Conococheague Street  
Northernmost section of a late 19th century painted brick Italianate commercial/residential row. Original storefront.
- WA-WIL-028 - 102 North Conococheague Street  
Three story commercial/residential Italianate building covered with modern brick veneer.

Two story, two bay, aluminum sided simple Italianate frame house with a false mansard roof.

Two story, ten bay brick rowhouse. Late 19th century.

Two story, four bay frame double house. Late 19th century.

Two story, four bay frame double house. Late 19th century.
- \* WA-WIL-033 - Cushwa Coal Building  
Large two and one half story brick and frame commercial/residential building, a former warehouse. Part of the C & O Canal National Park.
- \* WA-WIL-034 - C & O Canal Building  
A large brick warehouse/railroad building. Late 19th or early 20th century. Part of C & O Canal National Park.
- WA-WIL-035 - West Potomac Street  
One and a half story, three bay log house, wood sided.
- WA-WIL-036 - 135-137 West Potomac Street  
Two story, frame double house, aluminum sided. 19th century.
- WA-WIL-037 - 123 West Potomac Street  
One and a half story four bay log house covered with asbestos siding. Ca. 1800.
- \* WA-WIL-038 - 121 West Potomac Street  
Two story, three bay brick house with Flemish bond facade and water table. Late 18th century.
- WA-WIL-039 - 119 West Potomac Street  
19th century two story, three bay log house.
- WA-WIL-040  
Two story, four bay frame double house dating from the second half of the 19th century.

- WA-WIL-041 - 109 West Potomac Street  
Two story, three bay brick house with common bond facade,  
built during the late 19th century.
- WA-WIL-042 - 103 West Potomac Street  
Two story, three bay German sided log house dating from the  
19th century.
- WA-WIL-043 - 33 West Potomac Street  
Large yellow brick church with Gothic arched windows dating  
from the late 19th century.
- WA-WIL-044 - 35 West Potomac Street  
Painted brick Queen Anne style house, late 19th century.
- WA-WIL-045 - 33 West Potomac Street  
Two story stone and frame early 20th century bungalow with  
Colonial renovations.
- WA-WIL-046 - 23-25 West Potomac Street  
Six bay, two story frame double house with a symmetrical facade.  
Early 20th century.
- WA-WIL-047 - 21 West Potomac Street  
Two story, three bay frame house dating from the late 19th or  
early 20th century. Asbestos sided.
- WA-WIL-048 - 17 West Potomac Street  
Two story, six bay 19th century house with two bay, frame,  
shed extension. The main section may be of log construction.  
The addition serves a commercial function.
- WA-WIL-049 - 15 West Potomac Street  
Two story, four bay log or frame house covered with narrow  
gauge siding. 19th century.
- WA-WIL-050 - 13 West Potomac Street  
Two story brick house showing influence of the Queen Anne


