This frame house is a two-story, three-bay by two-bay L-shaped house. It has a gable roof with a standing seam metal covering. The main facade has a central entrance, six-over-six windows in the other two bays of the first story and three bays of the second story. A small entrance porch with a gable roof is over the front door. The house is on a concrete block foundation. It appears to date from the early 20th century.

The house is located on the west side of Rt. 65, at the intersection with **Ruxbury** Road. It is located on a fairly flat site with no other houses around it except for **several** outlying farms. The main facade faces east.

The walls of the house are covered with a brown-painted wood siding. All the windows have a wide board framing with a short shelf across the top. These features make the house look like it was built in the late 19th century. However, the house sits on a concrete block foundation which would make it early 20th century unless the house has been moved. The roof has a chimney at its peak at the northern end of the house. Other than the window frame and the porchway, which is supported on round columns, there is little ornamentation to the house.

The house has a small shed and a concrete block garage as outbuildings.


