The Maugansville Feed Service Complex includes a house converted to an office, and a cluster of feed and grain elevators and silos complete with chutes and piping to convey the grain among the silos. Also present are large wooden and metal storage buildings. Both the house and the groups of silos are situated to be parallel with the railroad, rather than parallel to the street. The house is a two story, three bay frame building covered with masonite siding. Its principal entrance is currently in the gable end facing the railroad tracks. On this facade, the entrance is placed centrally in the gable end wall. On the southeast facade, there are also three bays and an entrance, but the entrance is offset to share a jamb with the more southerly window. There are only two windows at the second story level. Windows have two over two sash. A character defining feature is the wraparound porch which is supported by square posts. The silos are arranged in pairs with the forward three pairs being of corrugated metal and those to the rear being of reinforced concrete. A suspended shed roof covers a loading site for railroad cars. The concrete portions of the building are older and even retain historic signage. The elevator was established in the late 19th century by Joseph Horst, perhaps in partnership with Isaac Eby. Apparently it was destroyed by fire and rebuilt sometime between 1925 and 1949. Much of the present structure was present in 1949 as shown in a historic photograph. Apparently Horst and Eby also established a store on the property.

Built in the 2nd quarter of the 20th century, the Maugansville Elevator complex, is located at the south end of the Village of Maugansville directly adjacent to the Pennsylvania Railroad tracks. The complex includes a house converted to an office, and a cluster of feed and grain elevators and silos, complete with chutes and piping, to convey the grain among the silos. Also present are large wooden and metal storage buildings, a concrete block building, and a frame storage building. The elevator silos are arranged in pairs with the forward three pairs being of corrugated metal and those to the rear being of reinforced concrete. A suspended shed roof covers a loading area. The concrete silos are older and even retain historic signage. Directly west of the elevators are a grain room, an annex, a boiler room, and a frame storage shed. In 1963, an early 20th century two-story frame house was incorporated under the ownership of the Elevator Company. Historic elements of the elevator complex include the concrete silos, the adjacent two-bay portion of the grain room and the frame storage building. Other buildings on the property less than 50 years old, however, should be considered contributing buildings in the future. Visual unity is created by the relationship of these buildings and structures to one another and their location between a farm lane and the railroad tracks.

The elevator facility is located at the intersection of Village Mill Drive and Railroad Street, a short cross-street. Both the house and the group of silos are situated to be parallel with the railroad, rather than parallel to the street. The elevators are a prominent feature of the streetscape. Located next to a residential block to the south, the rail tracks to the north, and farmland to its west; the setting clearly defines the elevator's historic association with the railroad, the farming community, and the Village of Maugansville.

The elevator facility consists of six metal silos at the east end of the facility facing Maugansville Road. Directly behind the metal silos are six older silos constructed of poured concrete squares. Following the silos is the concrete grain room and the annex which is punctuated by openings throughout for windows and chutes where grain is mixed for certain types of feed. The boiler room contained within a tall metal building contains equipment formerly used to flake the corn to soften the kernel as opposed to crushing the kernel. A series of grain elevators extend from the complex to several feet beyond the tops of the silos and attached buildings. According to a date plaque, the portion of the grain room beyond the two-bay section was built in 1961 and the boiler room appears to be a later addition.

Historically, the structure was known as the elevator because the grain was deposited at the top and came out the bottom. No exterior system transport area noted on a 1949 dated photograph. Today, the exterior system of elevators, containing cups to carry the grain, transport the grain from an auger in the ground, where it is initially deposited from trucks, and carries it to its destination in a silo for storage or to a mixing area to create feed.

The four-bay, frame, side-gabled storage building is covered with a standing seam metal roof. The first floor contains four open bay areas and the second floor contains four equally spaced sliding doors. The west end gable contains an opening in the gable and a second opening in the second floor close to the south edge of the wall. The north side has a pulley door on the west end of the first floor and east side is attached to the complex.

According to a USGS map, the wooden and metal storage buildings located west of the elevator, are less than 50 years old and a date stone on the concrete block building dates it to 1956. The concrete block building, located south of the elevator, is used as a cabinet shop. A large modern metal storage building is located between the house and the concrete block building.

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Located south of the silos is a frame dwelling, built in 1900, that has been converted to a feed supply store. The building is a contributing element of the Maugansville Historic District (WA-I-248). The frame two-story side gable building rests on a stone foundation and is vernacular in style with a wrap-around porch and 2/2 double-hung sash windows. Asphalt shingles cover the roof. Masonite siding covers the original clap board siding. The end gables contain cornice returns and the south gable has an end chimney. The wrap-around porch on the north and east sides of the building features turned posts, a tongue-and-groove floor, and a plywood ceiling. The east facade contains an off-center panel door with a flat transom and simple molding flanked by two windows on the first floor and two windows on the second floor. The north elevation facing the railroad tracks has a centrally located door on the first floor flanked by two windows, three equally-spaced windows on the second floor and paired two-light windows in the gable.

The west elevation facing the metal storage building, has two windows on the first floor and two small square windows with side-by-side lights on the second floor. The south elevation has a small wood addition with a metal standing seam roof. The main block contains one window on the first floor and two on the second. Two 2/2 small windows are in the gable.

The interior of the building has been completely altered to accommodate its retail/office function. Floors are covered with carpet or linoleum. Remaining historic features include wood molding around the windows, and the stair rail with newel post. New hollow wood doors are in the upstairs rooms, with the exception of paneled wood doors to the bathroom and attic. The stairs are centrally located and located immediately at the north elevation door. A hole in an upstairs room wall reveals wood lath and plaster construction. Changes to the frame building include the addition of masonite siding and an addition to the south end that covers the original window opening on the first floor of the south end. Despite the changes to the building, the original massing and design remains intact.

The Maugansville Elevator is significant for its association with the agricultural heritage of Maugansville and the surrounding farming community. The elevators are used to store, process and mix grain prior to their shipment via the railroad. The elevator complex site is closely allied with the railroad industry and the development of the village since the late 19th century when the first elevators were built, and later in the 2nd quarter of the 20th century when the Pennsylvania Railroad built new elevators.

### History

In 1862, Joseph Horst, a Mennonite, acquired the land that the elevator complex is located on at the southwest corner of the railroad tracks, from his father John Horst, Sr. and a Michael Horst. Joseph Horst began life on a farm and eventually owned a 133-acre farm near Maugansville. His many accomplishments include activities such as a land developer in the village, establishing the Maugansville Creamery in 1892, and a stockholder in the Cearfoss and Hagerstown turnpike<sup>1</sup>. According to the 1877 Washington County Atlas, the Cumberland Valley Railroad train station was located on the northeast side of the tracks close to J. Horst's residence. The station and residence no longer exist and the site is now a park.

The exact year the first elevator was built is unknown. One source states that in 1882, twenty years after acquiring the land, Joseph Horst built a store-room and station house in Maugansville beside the Cumberland Valley Railroad. Horst ran a general mercantile business for 17 years, dealt in lumber and coal, and from 1884-1899 he was also station agent and postmaster<sup>2</sup>. The store-room may refer to an elevator. Another source states that the first elevator was built in 1893 by Joseph Horst and Isaac Eby and was first conducted as a general store and then later expanded to sell coal, lumber and feed<sup>3</sup>. Since Horst owned the property from 1862-1899, either of these sources may be correct. In 1899, Horst retired and sold the store to his son Daniel who apparently kept the business going until 1914<sup>4</sup>.

In 1914, Daniel Horst sold the parcels to the Cumberland Valley Railroad which became the Pennsylvania Railroad in 1919. A 1925 photograph shows passengers at the Maugansville Station which was housed in the old store and elevator building<sup>5</sup>. These buildings no longer exist. Reportedly the

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elevator burned and was rebuilt and updated with three additional grain bins<sup>6</sup>. According to the former president and manager of the company, the new elevator was built by the Pennsylvania Railroad and leased to local people<sup>7</sup>.

The Maugansville Elevator & Lumber Company was incorporated in 1931 and leased the elevator from the Pennsylvania Railroad. A photograph dated to 1949 shows the existing concrete silos and the grain area toward the rear of the photograph. The silos in the foreground contain a painted sign "Wayne Feeds", which is still visible today. Based on the 1925 photograph showing the former elevator and the 1949 photograph of the new elevator, the existing concrete silos were built between that time frame. A former one story building appears in front of the elevators with a sign "Maugansville Elevator and Lumber Co." Reportedly, a lumber yard and planing mill opened at the Elevator and operated from the 1940s to the 1970s. Plywood was delivered by railroad and custom cabinets made. The elevator has always been the largest business in the Maugansville community, serving farmers with supplies and as a market for their grain products. The lumber yard/feed mill was a busy place in the 1940s with ten to twenty railroad cars coming into the elevator at a time during the summer months.<sup>8</sup>

The railroad sold the facility in 1958 to Mark Petre of Arlo Farms who sold it three years later to the Maugansville Elevator and Lumber Company. In 1986, the current owners, the Maugansville Feed Service, Inc., acquired the property. Today the lumber mill continues to operate on a part-time custom basis and the elevator is still in full operation. However, today the grain is shipped by truck, never by train.

### Theme

Economic activity in Maugansville, 1880-1947. In the 1880s, Maugansville was a thriving rural village community that prospered, in part, as a result of the surrounding rich agricultural farmland. From the later 19th to the mid-20th century Maugansville has remained associated with farming and derived economic benefit from by producing jobs. Over the years businesses have included a blacksmith shop, a cider press that used many of the apples bought from nearby growers, a cannery, a creamery which bought milk from area farmers and made butter, a hatchery, a foundry that made plows and other agricultural equipment, and an implement shop that sold and serviced farm machinery, and a feed grinder business. Primary among the support services was the elevator complex which stored, processed, and shipped grain via the adjacent railroad line. The elevator complex and the railroad greatly expanded the market for area farmers and the fact that an elevator complex has operated on this site since the late 19th century is an indication of the abundant agricultural activity of the late 19th to mid-20th century within the Conococheague District. Activities added later in the 19th century, including coal and lumber, further enhanced the economic significance of the site as an employment and service center and strengthened Maugansville's stance as a rural trading community.

By the mid-twentieth century, Maugansville experienced a transition into a "bedroom" community as it lost its local commercial and agricultural enterprises to modern commercial development east of town. Today much of Maugansville is surrounded by contemporary 20th century residential and commercial development, however, the community still exhibits the character of both a conservative agricultural village and an early to mid-20th century residential community, partially due to the continuing existence






