DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Huyler House is located along the west side of Beaver Creek Church Road just south of the Beaver Creek in Washington County, Maryland. It is situated near the road and faces east.

The structure is a two-story, four-bay stone dwelling with black and white trim. A three-bay, one and one half story wing extends from the north gable end and a two-story three-bay shed roof el was added to the rear of the main section. The el is said by local historians to date from about 1850.

All walls of the house are constructed of roughly coursed local fieldstone. At the south elevation of the main section, the windows are topped with decorative flat stone arches. An entrance at the rear of the main section shows similar stone work. Other windows are without decorative embellishment.

Windows are located on all elevations of the structure. Most contain two-over-two pane Victorian period sashes. However, at the rear or west wall of the one and a half story section are two sets of nine-over-six light sashes. Windows of the two main stories are held within narrow frames which are finished with a bead. At the attic level, however, wider window frames may be seen. First story windows are flanked by paneled shutters.

The main entrance is located in the third bay from the south end of the house, near the center of the facade wall. The doorway is treated quite simply and includes a narrow transom. The door is framed similarly to the windows.

An early 20th century period one-story porch extends along the front of the house.

The roof of the main section of the house and the porch is of grey-green asphalt shingles. The roofing material of the wing is sheet metal. A Victorian period gable with decorative shingle work and wooden trim has been added to the attic of the wing. A gable roof dormer protrudes from the west slope of the roof at the rear of the main section. Large brick chimneys rise from inside each gable of the main section and inside the end of the extension.

The house is in excellent condition and stands on a tract containing 30 acres. Also on the property are ruins of a mill operated by the Newcomer family.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The significance of this house lies in its architecture. Apparently built during the early 19th century, it is one of a number of stone houses along the Beaver Creek. The property is also important for its association with the Newcomer milling business, an operation which included several mills in the Beaver Creek area (see also Doub's Mill, WA-II-090).

In the Washington County deed records, this property is identified as the "Homestead of the late John Newcomer." John Newcomer, son of Henry Newcomer was born December 19, 1797 and died April 21, 1861. He represented Washington County in the Maryland Senate from 1840-46 and later served as County Commissioner.¹

Records indicate that John Newcomer's land was previously that of his father, Henry Newcomer who operated a mill. Ruins of a mill can still be seen a short distance southeast of the house.

Milling was a major commercial enterprise in the area and contributed substantially to the economy of 18th and 19th century Washington County.


