Description:

The Warner Residence likely was constructed as part of the Mt. Aetna Furnace operation by the Hughes brothers. According to tax maps, the structure was built around 1800 and, the masonry and stucco construction reflects other documented structures (originally adjacent to the Warner Residence, now demolished) associated with the furnace operation. In 1827, the property was sold to John Horine who purchased a majority of the Hughes Mt. Aetna property. Currently, the structure serves as a single-family residence.

The Warner Residence consists of a 1 ½-story, side-gable, vernacular structure with extensive additions to the original building. Currently, stucco covers the original portion and some of the rear addition while wood clapboards cover the remaining surfaces. The roof is asphalt shingles, with two symmetrical gables at the façade. The residence faces south on its lot. It has a short setback from Mt. Aetna Road and is surrounded by grass on three sides. The fourth side, at the east, has a gravel driveway abutting it. This driveway runs from Mt. Aetna Road to the rear of the residence. Two contemporary sheds stand at the north end of the lot.

Significance:

The Warner Residence is associated with the development of Mt. Aetna and possibly with the operation of the furnace.

The Warner Residence consists of a 1 ½-story, side-gable, vernacular structure with extensive additions to the original building. Currently, stucco covers the original portion and some of the rear addition while wood clapboards cover the remaining surfaces. The roof is asphalt shingles, with two symmetrical gables at the façade. The residence faces south on its lot. It has a short setback from Mt. Aetna Road and is surrounded by grass on three sides. The fourth side, at the east, has a gravel driveway abutting it. This driveway runs from Mt. Aetna Road to the rear of the residence. Two contemporary sheds stand at the north end of the lot.

On the residence, the façade (consisting of the original structure with two gable additions) contains two 6/6 windows and a door. These three openings are evenly spaced across the elevation. At the roof, two gables with wood siding and palladian windows were added. The two side elevations contain the original structure with a two-story modern addition extending from the stucco structure and tying into the original gable roof. On the east elevation, the original structure contains two 6/6 windows and a fixed 6-pane unit. A door stands at the juncture between the original section and the addition; a cantilever created by the two-story addition shelters the door. The addition has a 1/1 window facing south and a palladian window on the second story, facing east. The original portion on the west façade has two 6/6 windows and a chimney that stands just north of the windows. Beyond the chimney, a 4/4 window exists in a stucco wall, beneath the wood clapboard second story section. The rear elevation houses a two level porch with stairs running between the levels and to the adjacent driveway. Sliding glass doors provide access from the first and second story onto the porch. In addition, a door and a modern window stand to the east of the porch structure and a sunroom stands to the west. The sunroom employs brick for the lower wall surface and series of 1/1 windows on top of the brick wall to enclose the space.

The two sheds at the north end of the lot are contemporary structures. One is an enclosed structure with vertical siding, asphalt shingles, a set of double doors, and a double awning window. The other structure is partially open, with a shed roof and vertical siding.

The Warner Residence likely was constructed as part of the Mt. Aetna Furnace operation by the Hughes brothers. According to tax maps, the structure was built around 1800 and, the masonry and stucco construction reflects other documented structures (originally adjacent to the Warner Residence, now demolished) associated with the furnace operation. In 1827, the property was sold to John Horine who purchased a majority of the Hughes Mt. Aetna property. Currently, the structure serves as a single-family residence.

The Warner Residence stands east of the MD 66/Mt. Aetna Road intersection, on the north side of the road, in the area known as Mt. Aetna in Washington County, Maryland. Washington County was established on September 6, 1776 by an act of the Provincial Convention of Maryland. Previous to that time, from the organization of Frederick County in 1748, it had been a portion of that county. It is unknown exactly when and where the first settlement in Washington County occurred. The Lords Proprietary initiated surveys and began granting lands to individuals as early as 1732. These first settlers were chiefly Germans, with a few English, and they settled on large tracts of land. The area known as Mt. Aetna, initially comprising 4,482 acres was granted to Daniel and Samuel Hughes in the mid-late 1700s.

The Hughes brothers were involved in iron manufacturing and were considered the most conspicuous manufacturers in the County. They operated furnaces at Hampton before shifting their operation to Black Rock, South Mountain and the Mt. Aetna area. The Mt. Aetna Furnace was located on the south side of the current Mt. Aetna Road. The Hughes became large landholders in the area, owning at least 12,373 acres in the vicinity. Most of this acreage was woodland that provided the large quantities of charcoal consumed by the blast furnaces. Food for the workers was also raised on the land as Mt. Aetna evolved from a factory center to an isolated community for the furnace employees.

The Revolutionary War created lots of work for the Mt. Aetna Furnace as the Hughes brothers sought and received contracts from Maryland and the Continental Congress in Philadelphia to cast cannon. Cannon production began during the winter of 1775-76 and continued until mid-1781. Following work for the Revolutionary War, Mt. Aetna continued as a successful venture throughout the War of 1812, yet operations ceased by 1820 and the Hughes began selling their Mt. Aetna land. William Price and Franklin Anderson acquired much of the Mt. Aetna estate in the mid-1820s. In 1827, they sold most of these lands (1,100-acres) to John Horine. Horine also obtained portions of adjacent grants such as



8. Significance (continued)

"Resurveyed on Adventure" and "Resurveyed on Discontent." Horine's property included much of the project area except the northwestern quadrant of the intersection, and the original Mt. Aetna tract remained intact through the early twentieth century. Other Horine land was parceled and sold much sooner as the area developed as an agricultural area and a crossroads community although the area was never heavily developed. However in 1922, Elder Fleagle moved to the area and attempted to develop Mt. Aetna as a residential area. Fleagle and his Seventh Day Adventist Congregation built the Highland View Academy (now the Mt. Aetna Elementary School) and they did manage to develop a "well-paved conglomeration of lovely homes, two schools, and an independent water supply." This development occurred east of the project area.

National Register Evaluation:

While the Warner Residence is associated with the development of Mt. Aetna and possibly with the operation of the furnace, it is not eligible for the National Register of Historic Places. Research does not clearly connect the structure with the Mt. Aetna furnace operation although the Hughes Brothers held the property during the time of the furnace operation. However, the changes in use of the structure and its substantial alterations have diminished the structure's ability to convey this potential association. Therefore, the structure does not possess an association with significant events or trends, and is not eligible under Criterion A. The structure is not eligible under Criterion B either. Research into the construction and subsequent tenants did not identify any known association with significant persons. Similarly, the structure is not eligible under Criterion C because it no longer embodies distinctive characteristics of a type and period of construction. Modern additions, change in use, and area development have compromised the structure's design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling, and association. Finally, the property has no known potential to yield important information, so it is not eligible under Criterion D, and the seven criteria consideration do not apply.






