DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This farmhouse is located on the south side of Cool Hollow Road, between U.S. Route 40 and 40-A southeast of Hagerstown in Washington County, Maryland. It is situated on an area of level ground and faces east.

The house is a two story, seven bay building constructed of roughly coursed native limestone. Raised "V" mortar joints remain. Decorative masonry consists of wedge shaped stones suggesting keystones centered above the windows. The two northern bays are recessed beneath a double porch which is included under the main roof span.

Windows and doors are aligned with each other in the walls. They have wide frames, their joints secured with wooden pegs and trimmed with ogee molding. Most windows have two over two pane late 19th century sashes but some nine over six pane sashes remain. On the north and west walls windows retain pairs of shutters with louvered top sections and paneled lower parts. Hinge pins for shutters remain in front elevation window frames.

The main entrance is located in the third bay from the south end or the center of the forward five bays of the front elevation. The entrance has a semi-circular arched top formed by an irregular structural arch of stone, brick and wood. Lining the arch are pieces of wood to which is applied a thin veneer with a reeded surface. At intervals along the jambs and around the arch are wooden nailing blocks onto which was secured a wooden entrance piece which has since been removed. Filling the arch above the door is a semi-circular fanlight with delicate ray muntins with curved decorative work between the rays. The door has six raised panels and paneled jambs. Large round cut stone blocks provide steps to the entrance. Other doors much plainer in appearance are located beneath the double porch in the second bay from the north end at the first and second story levels. The double porch is supported by chamfered square posts and is enclosed with a plain balustrade.

The roof is sheathed with standing seam sheet metal and terminates with barge boards set directly against the end walls. Brick chimneys are located inside the gables and at the interior of the house at the point where the front wall is recessed. Beneath the eaves boxing is a course of cornice molding,

Just north of the house is a board and batten sided out kitchen with gingerbread trim along its barge and eaves areas.

A small frame bank barn and frame sheds are located east of the house. The buildings appear to be in good to excellent condition and stand on a small farm containing 56.5 acres.

This farmhouse is an excellent example of an early 19th century rural dwelling with certain architectural refinements. One of the most prominent architectural features of this house is its front door with Federal reeded trim and delicate fanlight. The original entrance piece of unfortunately missing. The general form of the house with a recessed double porch, follows a prominent regional vernacular type associated with the 19th century. This property is said to have been in the Grey family during much of the 19th century.


