## DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This house is located at the end of a long private lane extending in a northwesterly direction from Maryland Route 34 at Keedysville in Washington County, Maryland. It is situated on rolling limestone ground and faces south. The lane leading to the farm is an abandoned county road which ran from Keedysville to what are now Wheeler and Coffman Roads.

The dwelling is a two-story, four-bay stone structure with a two-story, four-bay addition also of stone attached to its east gable end. The walls of both sections of the house are constructed of coursed local limestone with more careful masonry evident in the main or older portion of the house. The house is built into a slight slope with its front elevation being of greater height. Evident near the bottom of the side and front elevations is a stone water table. Set high in the west gable is a rectangular tablet which apparently carried a date at one time. It has deteriorated to the point that the date can no longer be read from ground level [although according to one witness it reads 179(?)]. A porch extends along the first story of the front elevation of the main section, while a double porch shelters the entire front wall of the addition. The porch on the addition, which appears to be original, is supported by square posts linked by a plain balustrade at the second story level and by board railings at the first story. Portions of the stone walls under the porches have been painted white. No decorative stone masonry is associated with the window and door openings. Variations in the appearance of the exterior masonry suggest that a simplified belt course is present between the first and second stories of the main section. The masonry in the addition changes abruptly at the second story level and toward its east end suggesting that the addition may not have been built at one time.

Windows appear to have been spaced evenly in the front wall of the main section. Wide, pegged frames trimmed with quarter round hold 12-over-12 light sash at the first story and nine-over-six pane sash at the second story level. The window frames appear to be original or early. Frames in the addition are quite narrow and hold six-over-six pane sash at both stories.

The main entrance to the older section is located in the third bay from its west gable end. It is framed similarly to the windows and includes a four-light transom. Entrances in the addition are located in the center bays of the front elevation. Other doors provide access to the upper level of the double porch. One door is located in the rear of the addition and evidence of alterations to the masonry around one window suggests that a second door in this elevation was removed.

Sheet metal sheaths the roofs of both sections of the house. A large, brick chimney which shows evidence of having been rebuilt is located inside the west gable end of the main section. A smaller brick flue with several courses of corbeling at its top is located inside the east gable end. Smaller brick chimneys project from inside the east end of the addition and from its interior. The eaves of the main section are finished with plain boxing terminating with deep returns. A course of simple cornice molding finishes the eaves. Barge boards are set directly against the end walls.

The interior of the main section is divided into three rooms and a stair hall which runs parallel to the rear or north elevation of the house. The main entrance

leads into a room which is now, and probably was originally, a kitchen. This room has a diagonally set fireplace with plain trim. West of the kitchen are two rooms with fireplaces set against the west wall. In these rooms, too, the woodwork is quite plain. At the second story level the floor plan is similar; however, the treatment of the rooms is much more elaborate. Fireplace mantels are trimmed with dentil molding set above decorative panels. In the southeast room at the second story level, built into the wall beside the fireplace, is a corner cupboard with a round arched top broken with a wooden keystone form of cartouche. Its lower section is trimmed with fluted pilasters, while its upper portion displays molding similar to that employed throughout the house. The shelves in the upper part of the cupboard, which can be seen through the multi-paned door, are decorated with scroll cut ends.

East of the house is a large frame bank barn and other buildings related to agricultural use.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

This house and its surrounding buildings are primarily significant for their architecture. Operating as a farm since the 18th century, the property is important for its contribution to Washington County's agricultural history.

According to a former owner of the farm, the datestone set in the gable of the house indicated that it was built during the 1780's. Although the building date has not been firmly established, the house does display characteristics of late 18th century construction. Among these are the massive pegged window frames, the multi-paned sash, and the use of diagonal fireplaces, as well as the general style of masonry and interior and exterior wood trim. Relatively few 18th century dwellings remain in Washington County and thus efforts should be made to recognize and preserve those that do. This example has had very few alterations.

The history of ownership of this house is unclear. Presumably it was held by members of the Hess family during the late 18th and early 19th centuries. Jacob Hess was an influential citizen of early Keedysville who established a mill there during the last quarter of the 18th century.

Deeds for this farm can be traced only as far back as May 5, 1823, when David Hess, who appears to have been Jacob's son or grandson, sold 83 1/2 acres to Amos Eakle (GG/270). The property remained in the Eakle family until 1843 when John D. Eakle sold it to Samuel Wagner (22/929). At that time, the farm contained slightly more than 145 acres. In 1894 the farm was purchased by Otho W. Miller (101/628), who in 1916 conveyed it to his daughter, Nora Miller Baker (150/100). It was held by her until 1959 when it was sold to the United States Steel Corporation.

The property includes parts of the grants, "Dear Bought," "If You Please," "Addition to Burrell's Choice," "I Have Got It" and "Hills and Dales and the Vineyard."



ROUGH SKETCH OF FLOOR PLAN



SKETCH MAP OF BUILDING LOCATIONS


