119 East Antietam Street is a south-facing, vertically massed, symmetrical, two-and-a-half-story, three-bay, brick, freestanding, residential structure. The brick is unusual in that it is white with red brick deliberately placed in a planned fashion to create a speckled effect. There is an S-shaped tie-rod end on the east elevation. Set directly at the public-right-of-way, the building has a side-gable roof sheathed with artificial roll. There is one interior, endwall brick chimney. The entrance is protected by a hipped-roof, open porch that runs the length of the building and is supported by squared posts connected by a slat railing. The interior door is located in the east bay and is craftsman in styling. Windows are set in wood frames, are double-hung, one-over-one sash, and have red and white brick soldier courses for representing lintels. There are two, one-story rear additions creating an L-shaped composition. The rear-most addition was originally an unattached structure according to the 1922 Sanborn.

A building, though probably not the extant one, is noted on the 1877 map of the town as being owned by J. Marker. The 1922 Sanborn notes the extant dwelling as 313 East Antietam and indicates that it was part of a much larger lot that extended to South Church Street.

The building is within the Western Maryland Geographic Organization, the Development Period of Industrial/Urban Dominance, and falls within the Historic Period Theme of Architecture, Landscape Architecture and Community Planning.
