
BUILDING DATE: mid-19th century (pre-1862)

200 West Antietam Street is a north-facing, horizontally massed, symmetrical, three-bay, two-and-a-half-story, frame, freestanding, residential structure resting on a concrete (over stone?) foundation. The building, which is set directly at the public-right-of-way on a corner lot, is sheathed with weatherboard siding. The standing-seam metal, side-gable roof has an interior endwall brick chimney and open eaves with gable returns. The entrance consists of a 1950s/1960s style door protected by a flat-roof portico supported by modern iron railings. Fenestration is composed of single, rectangular, wooden sash, double-hung, two-over-two windows in wide frames. There is a two-story wing to the rear and three outbuildings.






A commemorative plaque on the building indicates that the structure was standing at the time of the Battle of Antietam (1862). A building of the same configuration is noted on the 1877 map of the town as being owned by Mrs. Jackson. The structure appears on the 1922 Sanborn as 116 West Antietam Street.

The building is within the Western Maryland Geographic Organization, the Development Period of Agricultural-Industrial Transition, and falls within the Historic Period Theme of Architecture, Landscape Architecture and Community Planning.




