Description of Property and Eligibility Determination: *(Use continuation sheet if necessary and attach map and photo)*

This two-and-one-half-story, three-bay-wide, detached, frame, side-gabled, single-family dwelling with front intersecting gable is sided in a narrow bullnose clapboard. The front gable has a pointed arch window and fretwork. The house has two interior end chimneys; 2/2 wood sash windows; and a single-leaf, half-glass door with transom. The roof is clad in standing-seam metal. A two-story gable ell extends to the rear. The one-story, three-bay, shed-roofed porch has turned posts and sawnwork. The house sits atop a solid rubblestone foundation. Built ca. 1900, this house is part of the turn-of-the-century domestic architecture of Boonsboro and contributes to the Town of Boonsboro Historic District.

119 North Main Street is a west-facing, vertically massed, two-and-a-half-story-plus-basement, three-bay, frame, freestanding, residential structure. The building is set directly at the public-right-of-way and rests on a stone foundation. The Queen Anne structure has a side-gable, tin roof with an intersecting front gable in the center bay. The house has two, interior, endwall chimneys, open gable returns, and an ornamental cornice and vergeboard. The shed-roof eastlake porch that extends across the facade of the building is missing much of its original ornamental detailing. A one-story octagonal bay is located on the first floor under the porch roof. A raised panel door, located in the center bay, is slightly obscured by a storm door, but appears to be original to the building. Fenestration consists of rectangular, double-hung, two-over-two windows with ornamental surrounds. The attic window is pentoid in shape. The two-story rear ell is original to the building.

According to maps of the town, the building was constructed between 1897 and 1904 on what had been an empty lot that originally was part of the property to its south (115 Main Street). The bay under the porch is not noted on the 1904 Sanborn, but is shown on the 1910.

The building is within the Western Maryland Geographic Organization, the Development Period of Industrial/Urban Dominance, and falls within the Historic Period Theme of Architecture, Landscape Architecture, and Community Planning.
