

BUILDING DATE: 1930s-1940s

This is a west-facing, one-and-a-half-story, freestanding, English Tudor Revival cottage sited directly across the street from 422 North Main. The building is set back from the public-right-of-way on a landscaped lawn. It is constructed of orange brick, stone, and stuccoed surfaces in a revival style that was particularly popular in the 1930s and 1940s. Its cross-gable roof is covered with an artificial roll and it has two chimneys. The entrance is located in the center bay is composed of an oak door set into a round-arched opening. Windows are a combination of casement and double-hung styles. The garage is integrated into the design of the house, making the house an example of a typical suburban style building.

Although none of the historic maps of Boonsboro extends this far north, the design can date the building to approximately the 1930s or 1940s.

The building is within the Western Maryland Geographic Organization, the Modern Development Period, and falls within the Historic Period Theme of Architecture, Landscape Architecture, and Community Planning.
