



16 St. Paul Street is a north-facing, two-and-a-half-story, four-bay, brick, freestanding, residential structure. The building, which is set directly at the public-right-of-way, rests on a stone foundation and is laid in a common bond that has been painted red. The house has a side-gable, tin roof with two chimneys. A porch extends across the front facade and protects a frame, bay window under the porch and the center-bay entrance. The door is glazed and has a transom which has been blocked up. All of the windows are shuttered except the attic which has a four-pane casement window. The back of the building has a one-story frame and brick addition. The entire structure is vacant and in deteriorated condition. There is a fallen barn in the rear.

The structure is indicated on the 1877 map of Boonsboro. The 1897-1924 Sanborns show the structure as 144 East Church Street and a second structure directly behind it that is labeled as a barber. Although the second structure is still noted on the 1940 Sanborn, it is no longer occupied by the barber shop.

The building is within the Western Maryland Geographic Organization, the probable Development Period of Agricultural-Industrial Transition, and falls within the Historic Period Theme of Architecture, Landscape Architecture, and Community Planning.
