



18 St. Paul Street is a north-facing, horizontally massed, two-and-a-half-story, three-bay, frame, freestanding, residential structure. The building, which is set directly the public-right-of-way at the southwest corner of St. Paul and High Streets and rests on a stuccoed foundation, is covered with manufactured siding. It has a side-gable roof covered with artificial roll and has open eaves, gable returns, and two brick chimneys. The flat-roof porch wraps around the facade and west elevation of the house. Its columns have been replaced with iron railings. The entrance, which is located in a center bay, consists of a 12-pane glazed door. The windows, which have all been replaced with modern, double-hung, one-over-one sash, have wide wood surrounds. The building has a two-story rear ell and a one-story shed addition on that.

A building of similar configuration to the extant structure is indicated on the 1877 map of the town. The 1910-1940 Sanborn indicate this structure as 157 St. Paul.

The building is within the Western Maryland Geographic Organization, the probable Development Period of Agricultural-Industrial Transition, and falls within the Historic Period Theme of Architecture, Landscape Architecture, and Community Planning.
