



26 St. Paul Street is a north-facing, horizontally massed, two-and-a-half-story, three-bay, frame? freestanding, residential structure. The building, which is set slightly back from the public-right-of-way, rests on a stone foundation and is covered with manufactured siding. It has a side-gable, corrugated metal roof with one chimney. A slightly raised, hipped-roof porch extends across the facade and protects the east-bay entrance. The door is typical of those found primarily on Potomac Street--the upper portion is glazed and the lower portion has two wood panels. Fenestration includes rectangular, double-hung, six-over-one windows on the first floor and one-over-one windows on the second. There is a one-story rear addition. The property has two outbuildings in the yard.

A building at this site is indicated on the 1877 map of the town. The 1910-1940 Sanborns number the structure as 160 St. Paul.

The building is within the Western Maryland Geographic Organization, the probable Development Period of Agricultural-Industrial Transition, and falls within the Historic Period Theme of Architecture, Landscape Architecture, and Community Planning.
