



34 St. Paul Street is a north-facing, horizontally massed, two-and-a-half-story, three-bay, frame, freestanding, residential structure. The building, which is set at the public-right-of-way, rests on a stone foundation and is covered in manufactured siding. It has a side-gable, tin roof with open eaves and exterior chimney. A simplified, eastlake, hipped-roof porch wraps around the facade and west elevation of the house. The door is typical of those found primarily on Potomac Street--the upper portion is glazed and the lower portion has two wood panels. It is topped by a three-light transom. The fenestration is replacement double-hung, one-over-one windows. The yard contains an old detached garage.

A building of similar configuration is indicated on the 1877 map of the town. The 1910-1940 Sanborn maps number the structure 163 St. Paul.

The building is within the Western Maryland Geographic Organization, the probable Development Period of Agricultural-Industrial Transition, and falls within the Historic Period Theme of Architecture, Landscape Architecture, and Community Planning.
