



36 St. Paul Street is a north-facing, horizontally massed, one-and-a-half-story, three-bay, brick, freestanding, residential structure. The building is set at the public-right-of-way, rests on a stone foundation, and laid in common bond that has been painted white. The structure has a side-gable, artificial shingle roof with two chimneys. The hipped-roof porch wraps around the facade and west elevation of the building and is supported on slender columns. The door is typical of those found primarily on Potomac Street--the upper portion is glazed and the lower portion has two wood panels. Fenestration includes double-hung, one-over-one sash windows on the first floor and long, four-over-four lights in the clerestory. There is a two-story frame additions to the rear.

A building of the exact configuration and location is indicated on the 1877 map of the town. The 1910-1940 Sanborn maps number the structure 164 St. Paul.

The building is within the Western Maryland Geographic Organization, the probable Development Period of Agricultural-Industrial Transition, and falls within the Historic Period Theme of Architecture, Landscape Architecture, and Community Planning.
