
BUILDING DATE: late 19th, early 20th century

103-105 Lakin Street is a south-facing, two-and-a-half-story, four-bay, frame, freestanding, Queen Anne double house. The building, which is set back slightly from the public-right-of-way, rests on a concrete foundation. It has a cross-gable, artificial shingle roof with open eaves, and two brick chimneys. A hipped-roof porch extends across the facade of the house and supported by battered posts resting on brick piers. A wood balustrade separates the two center-bay entrances that have a glazed panel above two horizontal wood panels. Fenestration includes replacement, double-hung, one-over-one sash windows that are paired on the first and attic stories and are set alone on the second floor.

Although this building is first indicated on the 1924 Sanborn as a single-family dwelling numbered 107 Lakin Street, it should be noted that the earlier historic maps of the town do not extend this far east. Based on the architectural style of the building and the date of construction of other similar buildings in Boonsboro, this building appears to date from the late 19th, early 20th century. By 1940, it had been divided into two units, according to the Sanborn map.

The building is within the Western Maryland Geographic Organization, the probable Development Period of Industrial/Urban Dominance, and falls within the Historic Period Theme of Architecture, Landscape Architecture, and Community Planning.
