



107 Lakin Street is a south-facing, two-and-a-half-story, three-bay, brick, freestanding, American Four-Square residential structure. The building, which is set on a lawn back from the public-right-of-way, rests on a rock-faced stone foundation. The brick which is multi-colored and scored, is laid in a running bond. The structure has a hipped, artificial shingle roof with one chimney at the center and a hipped-roof dormer facing the street. The flat-roof porch supported by brick piers extends across the facade and protects a one-story bay window and the west-bay entrance. The door has a diamond-paned, leaded glass panel and is flanked by sidelights and topped by a transom. It is set in a segmental arch. Fenestration includes segmentally arched, double-hung, four-over-one windows.

The earliest map to show this portion of Boonsboro is the 1940 Sanborn on which this building is noted as 108 Lakin Street. According to the owner, it was constructed in 1929. Based on the style of the structure, as well as the construction date of other identical buildings in the town, this is a highly likely date.

The building is within the Western Maryland Geographic Organization, the Modern Development Period, and falls within the Historic Period Theme of Architecture, Landscape Architecture, and Community Planning.
