Prepare both a summary paragraph and a general description of the resource and its various elements as it exists today.

The frame house is a two-story frame structure constructed in a rectangular plan with a two-story addition on the rear. It has a three-bay by one-bay main section and a full-length, one-bay rear addition. The main section with its shape, fieldstone foundation and gable roof is similar to several of the early structures in Sandy Hook. The date of construction is mid-19th century.

The property is located on the north side of Sandy Hook Road, approximately .05 mile east of Clark Road, in Sandy Hook. The house sits close to the road. The main facade faces south.

The two-story structure is constructed of frame covered in asphalt shingle siding. The structure is built on a fieldstone foundation. The main facade is symmetrically arranged around a central entrance and a three-bay, one-story porch. The entrance is centrally located. Two-over-two sash windows are located in the outer bays of the first story, the three bays of the second story and one on each story of each gable end. The three-bay, one-story porch has a flat roof supported on square posts. The corners of the house have corner boards painted white. The roof has a boxed cornice and is covered in sheet metal. Interior-end brick chimneys rise from each gable end. The two-story rear addition runs the full length of the house. The upper portion of it is covered in asphalt shingles while the lower portion is covered in German siding. It contains small two paned windows in its bays. The addition projects slightly out on the west end of the structure.






