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7. Description

The Ringgold Historic District is a primarily residential historic district of forty-three acres located in the unincorporated village of Ringgold in the northwestern quadrant of Election District No. 14 (the Ringgold District), in rural northern Washington County, Maryland, approximately twelve miles northeast of the county seat of Hagerstown and less than one-half mile south of the Mason-Dixon Line and the Franklin County, Pennsylvania border. The district includes portions of Barkdoll Street (Maryland Route 847), Midvale Street, and Misty Meadow Road. The Ringgold District contains a total of 46 resources, 42 of which (90%) contribute to the character of the district and 4 (10%) are non-contributing. Non-contributing resources are buildings erected outside the c. 1825-c. 1920 Period of Significance of the district and others, the extent of whose alteration has resulted in a loss of historic architectural integrity and their classification as non-contributing resources. All of the properties in the district are buildings except for the Springfield Cemetery (Resource No. 31), which is a contributing site within the context of the nomination. Approximately seventy-five percent of the resources in the district pre-date 1900, approximately fifteen percent of the resources were constructed between 1900 and the end of the Period of Significance c. 1920, and the remaining approximately ten percent are of modern construction and are non-contributing to the character of the district. The predominant character of the district is that of a rural western Maryland hamlet located atop a hill overlooking a spacious valley and consisting primarily of a single linear thoroughfare.

The architecture of the Ringgold Historic District consists principally of modest vernacular residences of two stories in height, located on either side of Barkdoll Street and on parts of Midvale Street and Misty Meadow Road.¹ A relatively small number of more pretentious homes represent a higher degree of sophistication than is seen in most of the architectural resources of the district. The vast majority of the district's architecture is of wood construction. Most of the homes retain front porches of varying scales and forms along with associated domestic outbuildings including sheds and garages. Larger dependencies are included in the resource count, while smaller outbuildings (sheds, small automobile garages, etc.) are treated as low-scale landscape features and are not represented in the count. The district retains integrity in each of its seven qualities: location, design, setting, materials, workmanship, feeling, and association.

The building lots of the Ringgold Historic District are irregular in plan, and reflect the patterns of traditional, unplanned, and unregulated subdivision of land generations prior to the onset of uniform formal subdivision require-

¹Alterations to Maryland Route 64 include a large cut and the bypassing of much of Ringgold, which left a portion of the community south of Route 64, including the District 14 School, a Colonial Revival-style brick school building, which appears to be minimally altered but is outside the district, separated by the expanse of the Route 64 cut. The school appears to meet National Register eligibility requirements as an individual property under Criteria A and C.

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ments. The topography rises considerably from Route 418 (which bypasses the district) to Barddoll Road, which is the principal north-south thoroughfare in the district. Property setback lines are irregular throughout the district and landscaping includes lawns both large and small.

The buildings in the district are rectilinear in form and generally vary in height between one-and-one-half and two-and-one-half stories. Most buildings are roofed with laterally-oriented gable roofs, clad in standing-seam metal or in asphalt shingles. Some historic chimneys have been retained, while others have been removed in the course of retrofitting heating systems and replacing roofs. Fenestration is nearly exclusively flat-topped; in several instances, a pointed-arch window suggests design influence from the Gothic Revival style of architecture; for the most part, windows are generally sparsely ornamented; some multi-light historic sash has been retained. The majority of the buildings in the district rest on substantial foundations of coursed rock-faced limestone.

As noted above, the architectural character of the Ringgold Historic District is primarily vernacular, with most buildings executed without reference to any particular formal building style. Some traditional house types are found in the district, including side-passage single-pile homes and central-passage double-pile houses to which have been appended later additions. Some properties exhibit more design sophistication than others. Among these are 14510, 14321, 14527, and 14537 Barkdoll Road (Resource Nos. 13, 24, 31, and 34, respectively), which are Federal-style houses. The Federal-style homes are of two stories, some with three-bay facades and others with five-bay arrangements. All are of brick construction, and some employ Flemish bond brick treatment while others are of common bond. One Italianate property is in Ringgold; it is a two-story brick building which appears to have been a commercial property which has been converted to residential use. Vernacular adaptations of the Gothic Revival style are located at 14528, 14432, and 14410 Barkdoll Road (Resource Nos. 7, 14, and 18, respectively). The Gothic Revival influence is seen in centered gables on facades and pointed-arched pedimental windows. The Colonial Revival style is represented in a vernacular adaptation seen at 14420 Barkdoll Road (Resource No. 17), which is a two-story wood residence with a centered gable on the facade and a Palladian window in the pediment of the gable. One Bungalow is in the district (14541 Barkdoll Road; Resource No. 35) and an American Foursquare is located at 22901 Midvale Road (Resource No. 22).

Near the center of the Ringgold Historic District is the only contributing site, the Springfield Cemetery (Resource No. 31), which lies along a hillside east of Barkdoll Road. Near the foot of this hill immediately inside the district's eastern boundary, is the River Brethren Church Meeting House, an 1871 vernacular church building of brick construction, with a laterally-oriented gable roof and five-bay lateral elevations punctuated by flat-topped fenestration

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with operable exterior shutters.

As noted in the introductory paragraph, the Ringgold Historic District retains historic and architectural integrity. Although modest in its scale and detailing, the overall character of the district is intact and represents the early growth and maturity of this hamlet throughout its Period of Significance. Very little demolition has occurred and only a very small number of newer buildings—modern residences and garages—have been built within the boundaries of the nominated area. Alterations to buildings within the district include the application of non-historic siding and the installation of replacement windows. These alterations are dispersed throughout the district and do not detract significantly from the ability of the nominated area to reflect its appearance throughout the Period of Significance.

Viewed in its entirety, the Ringgold Historic District is an architecturally-cohesive settlement which grew up along Barkdoll Road after the initial 1825 settlement of the community by pioneer Joseph Creager. The nominated area retains integrity and contains forty modestly-scaled historic residential properties, one historic church, and one contributing site.

The following properties lie within the Ringgold Historic District. The numbering corresponds to the district map which was submitted with the nomination documents. All properties are assumed to contribute to the character of the district except those after whose description an "NC" appears; these properties are non-contributing to the character of the district, either because they date from outside the Period of Significance of the district or because their extent of alteration has significantly compromised their individual character with reference to the district. The dates of construction are generally approximate and are based upon physical examination, upon the scant written documentation which exists for the district, and upon oral interviews conducted in the course of the preparation of the National Register documents.

1. **14606 Barkdoll Road** 1½-story vernacular cottage of wood construction with a laterally-oriented gable roof and intersecting gabled pavilion entrance projecting at the right side; windows flat-topped without notable ornament (c. 1900)
2. **14548 Barkdoll Road** two-story vernacular residence of wood construction with laterally-oriented gable roof and gablet on the facade; shiplap siding; two-bay facade; windows 2/2; single-story hip-roofed roof veranda wraps around the facade and side elevation (c. 1900)
3. **14542 Barkdoll Road** two-story vernacular residence of brick with a five-bay facade and laterally-oriented gable roof of standing seam metal, with interior gable-end chimneys;

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some multi-light sash has been retained, although most historic sash has been replaced; one-story porch on the facade set on a foundation of concrete block; in front of the house is a well with an hand pump, which is a contributing feature within the context of the resource (c. 1830)

4. rear, 14542 Barkdoll Road 1½-story two-bay automobile garage with gable roof (c. 1920)
5. 14538 Barkdoll Road 1½-story residence of indeterminate age considerably altered with the installation of non-historic siding, with a resultant loss of integrity (c. 1900; NC)
6. 14532 Barkdoll Road two-story vernacular residence of wood frame construction built on a raised foundation with a two-bay facade and the main entrance offset on the right side, suggesting a side-passage interior plan; laterally-oriented gable roof; single-story addition on the right side with modern bay window (c. 1850)
7. 14528 Barkdoll Road two-story Gothic Revival vernacular residence of wood with laterally-oriented gable roof and center gable on facade; three-bay facade with a one-story bay window on the right side; one-story wrap-around veranda; non-historic siding (c. 1880)
8. rear, 14528 Barkdoll Road wood frame dependency of indeterminate age and function
9. rear, 14528 Barkdoll Road wood frame dependency of indeterminate age and function
10. 14524 Barkdoll Road two-story vernacular residence of wood construction with laterally-oriented gable roof; four-bay facade; windows 2/2, flat topped; paired entry doors on the facade; interior gable end chimneys; one-story shed roof porch (c. 1830)
11. rear, 14524 Barkdoll Road two-story dependency of wood construction at rear of main house (c. 1870)
12. 14520 Barkdoll Road two story vernacular residence of wood construction with a laterally oriented-gable roof of standing seam metal; two-bay facade with the main entrance offset on the right, suggesting a side-passage interior plan; non-historic siding (c. 1850)
13. 14510 Barkdoll Road 2½-story Federal-style brick residence with a three-bay facade, laterally-oriented gable roof with shed-roofed wall dormers; some 9/6 sash remains; original first-floor entryway with side lights and distinctive six-panel wood door; two-story gallery porch on facade (c. 1830)
14. 14432 Barkdoll Road 2½-story Gothic Revival vernacular residence of wood construction with laterally-oriented gable roof and centered gablet on the three-bay facade; cen-

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- tered entryway with transom and sidelights; extending across the facade is a highly ornamented locally distinctive porch with a square balustrade. (c. 1850)
15. **14426 Barkdoll Road** 2-story vernacular Italianate brick building with three-bay facade; flat-roof with a stylized cornice; windows 2/2 (c. 1870)
16. **14422 Barkdoll Road** vernacular wood frame church with a large modern addition dated 1978 which eclipses the original historic building, with a resultant loss of integrity (NC)
17. **14420 Barkdoll Road** 2½-story Colonial Revival vernacular residence of wood construction with a laterally-oriented gable roof and a large intersecting gable with a Palladian window in the pediment; three-bay facade; two-story bay window; windows flat topped; stone retaining wall with ball finial ornamentation (c. 1910)
18. **14410 Barkdoll Road** 2½-story Gothic Revival vernacular residence of wood built on a raised foundation with a laterally-oriented gable roof; three-bay facade with a center gable with a pointed-arched window in the pediment; non-historic siding (c. 1860)
19. **14402 Barkdoll Road** two-story vernacular residence of wood construction with a three-bay facade; windows flat-topped 2/2; laterally-oriented gable roof; non-historic siding (c. 1850)
20. **rear, 14402 Barkdoll Road** within the context of this district, this is a large two-story barn of wood construction, with a gable roof and clad in corrugated metal siding (c. 1900)
21. **22932 Midvale Road** in the context of this district, this is a comparatively large-scale brick residential building with five-bay facade and laterally-oriented gable roof with interior gable-end chimneys; windows flat-topped; decorative brick eave treatment; a broad early-twentieth-century veranda extends across the facade and wraps around a portion of the right side (c. 1840)
22. **22901 Midvale Road** 2½-story American Foursquare of wood construction, with a two-bay facade with the entry offset on the left side; hipped roof with intersecting gable with original slate cladding retained; a hip dormer is on facade; non-historic siding; several out buildings of undetermined age and usage (1908)
23. **22905 Midvale Road** utilitarian outbuildings, clad in non-historic siding with a variety of other alterations and additions, with a resultant loss of integrity (NC)
24. **14321 Barkdoll Road** 2½-story, three-bay Federal-style residence of brick with some non-historic siding; three-bay facade; windows flat-topped with jack-arched lintels; a one-story Victorian-era porch extends across the facade (c. 1840)

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25. **23007 Midvale Road** single-story vernacular cottage of wood construction with laterally-oriented gable roof and interior gable-end chimneys with corbeled brick trim; shiplap siding; one-story one-bay porch on facade; windows flat-topped without distinctive ornament (c. 1880)
26. **23024 Midvale Road** 2½-story vernacular residence of wood construction with a three-bay facade; raised foundation of coursed rubble stone; windows are flat-topped 2/2, with pedimented heads; non-historic siding; several outbuildings, including a modern cement block garage, a board-and-batten smoke house, and a metal frame building just beyond the house (c. 1880)
27. **14426 Misty Meadow Road** (River Brethren Church Meeting House) vernacular brick church building, rectangular in plan, with a gable roof; windows are flat-topped with multi-light historic wood sash and exterior operable shutters; sparsely ornamented; significant to the local religious heritage of the Ringgold community (1871)
- 14403 Barkdoll Road** 2½-story eclectic residence of wood construction with an intersecting gable roof; three-bay facade with a single-story Neo-Classical Revival vernacular veranda; windows flat topped 2/2 with, pedimented heads and chronologically inappropriate exterior shutters; the pediments of the gables are shingled with decorative shingling trimmed with pointed-arched windows (c. 1900)
29. **east side, Barkdoll Road** Springfield Cemetery, a 3.08-acre contributing site within the context of the historic district; this is a community cemetery located on a side hill with the meeting house at the foot of the hill; throughout the cemetery are a variety of relatively small-scale unornamented stones; the entry gate portals remain, and were produced by the Rodgers Fence Company of Springfield, Ohio; long associated with the Church of the Brethren (See Resource No. 29), in 1996 the ownership of the Cemetery was transferred to the Ringgold Cemetery Association, Inc.
30. **14517-19 Barkdoll Road** two-story double house of wood construction, set on a foundation of fieldstone with a laterally-oriented gable roof; some original 6/6 windows, flat topped with shutter hangers (c. 1850)
31. **14527 Barkdoll Road** 2½-story Federal-style house of brick construction with Flemish bond on the symmetrical five-bay facade; centered entry suggesting a central-passage single-pile interior arrangement; interior gable-end chimneys; windows flat-topped with six-light sash remaining; exterior operable shutters; one-story raised porch; a stone retaining wall extends along the front perimeter of the lot, incorporating entry gates with ball finials (c. 1820)

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32. rear 14527 Barkdoll Road vernacular outbuilding of wood construction (c. 1890)
33. rear 14527 Barkdoll Road vernacular outbuilding of wood construction (c. 1890)
34. 14537 Barkdoll Road five-bay Federal-style central-passage "I-house" of common bond brick construction, with a five-bay facade and entrance with delicately glazed transom and side lights; 6/6 sash remains along with exterior operable louvered shutters and a one-story portico supported by wrought iron with some historic wrought iron posts; distinctive molded wood cornice (c. 1820)
35. 14541 Barkdoll Road 1½-story Craftsman-style Bungalow of wood construction with laterally-oriented gable roof and gable dormer on the two-bay facade; the main entrance offset on the right; recessed front porch is supported by brick piers and is articulated by a brick railing (c. 1913)
36. 14545 Barkdoll Road 1½-story vernacular cottage of wood construction with a two-bay facade and laterally-oriented gable roof standing seam metal; non-historic siding (c. 1920)
37. 14601 Barkdoll Road one-story cottage built outside the Period of Significance of the District (c. 1968; NC)
38. 14607 Barkdoll Road two-story vernacular residence of wood construction with laterally-oriented gable roof punctuated by a brick central chimney; two-bay facade with the main entrance offset on the right side; a one-story hipped-roof veranda with square balustrade supported by plain columns extends across the facade; the exterior surfaces are clad in asbestos shingles (c. 1880)
39. rear 14607 Barkdoll Road two-story insul-brick-clad outbuilding (c. 1910)
40. 14315 Barkdoll Road 2½-story vernacular brick residence with a gable roof; windows are flat-topped with some 6/6 sash remaining; a one-story hipped-roofed veranda with a standing seam metal roof extends across two sides of the building (c. 1840)
41. 14305 Barkdoll Road 1½-story brick cottage, vernacular in character, with a laterally-oriented gable roof; three-bay facade with centered entryway; one-story shed roof porch with a standing seam metal roof; small-scale dependencies of indeterminate age and usage (c. 1850)
42. 14303 Barkdoll Road 1½-story vernacular residence of wood construction, with laterally-oriented gable roof; two distinct sections indicate that the building was built in stages; some 6/6 sash remains, set in flat-topped openings; asbestos siding; one-story

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shed-roofed porch on the right side of the facade. (c. 1850)

43. **Rear, 14303 Barkdoll Road** large wood barn with gable roof and gable-end orientation to the street (c. 1900)
44. **side, 14305 Barkdoll Road** small-scale vernacular dependency of wood with standing seam metal roof
45. **14305 Barkdoll Road** two-story vernacular residence with a laterally-oriented gable roof; the three-bay facade suggests a side-passage interior plan; the house is built on a raised foundation; non-historic siding (c. 1840)
46. **14306 Barkdoll Road** 2-story vernacular residence of wood construction, set on a raised foundation of stone with an intersecting gable roof system; windows flat-topped, without notable ornament; the principal facade faces the intersection of Barkdoll and Midvale Roads and incorporates a wrap-around veranda with turned posts which appear to be original; non-historic siding (c. 1870)

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8. Significance

The Ringgold Historic District is significant under National Register Criterion C for *architecture*, containing a contiguous collection of locally-significant properties which reflect both popular styles of design prevalent in western Maryland from the 1820s through the 1920s and vernacular architecture representative of local building traditions in the area. The majority of properties in the Ringgold Historic District reflects primarily vernacular design in the rural reaches of western Maryland throughout the Period of Significance, which begins in 1825 when pioneer settler John

Creager erected a log house in the area (not extant), spans the dates of construction of the district's earliest extant buildings (Resource Nos. 3, 6, 14, 24, 34, and 37), and ends c. 1920, the approximate date of construction of the latest of the district's historic resources (Resource No. 36). The district contains locally-distinctive examples of vernacular architecture which, although executed without reference to formal design tenets, nonetheless represent the manifestation of local building traditions in this section of Washington County. The district contains only limited examples of formal styles including the Federal, Gothic Revival, Italianate, Bungalow, Colonial Revival, and American Foursquare. Specific examples of each of these appear in Section 7 of this narrative. The River Brethren Meeting House (Resource No. 29) is the district's only contributing institutional building and is a local manifestation of unadorned, vernacular religious architecture. The Springfield Cemetery (Resource No. 31) is a contributing site within the context of the district and reflects the self-sufficiency of early nineteenth-century western Maryland communities which provided a full range of services—including burial—to their citizens. The Ringgold Historic District clearly retains its historic rural character along with the physical integrity necessary to reflect its appearance during its Period of Significance.




Figure 1 This excerpt from Thomas Taggart's 1859 map illustrates the extent of development of Ringgold at that time, a little more than a quarter-century after the establishment of the settlement.

The Ringgold Historic District is located in Washington County Election District No. 14, which is known as the Ringgold District, in northern Washington County; the Election District's northern boundary is the Mason-Dixon line separating

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


Figure 2 The 1877 Washington County Atlas indicates that at that time, the village of Ringgold had developed to the general area covered by the nominated area.

Maryland from Pennsylvania. The village was settled by John Creager who erected a log house there in 1825 (not extant).² The community was first known as Ridgeville, due to its siting atop a plateau overlooking the valley west of South Mountain. The settlement soon became relatively self-sufficient, including a store operated by C. Hoffman, a doctor's office, a wagon shop, a school and the River Brethren Church. The church (Resource No. 29) is of brick construction, measuring 40' x 65', and was erected in 1871 at a cost of \$6,000. Adjoining the church is the Springfield Cemetery (Resource No. 31). Located along a hillside, the cemetery was apparently originally enclosed within an iron fence, only the gateposts of which remain. According to Scharf's 1906 *History of Western Maryland*, the cemetery was used as a burial ground even before John Creager built the first house in the village in 1825, since the earliest interment was that of Henry Lesh, who died in 1821.³

The post office was established here in 1850, at which time the name of the community was changed from Ridgeville to Ringgold, honoring Samuel Ringgold (1770-1829). The village's namesake came from Kent, England and built "Fountain Rock" from designs by America's premiere early architect, Benjamin Henry Latrobe. Ringgold owned 17,000 acres in the area, was a leading politician, and served in the state militia.

Early citizens of the community, who were recorded in an 1877 county atlas, include Dr. Frank Barkdoll, a local physician who settled there in 1845, Lewis Barkdoll, a blacksmith who arrived in 1841; the village's principal thoroughfare bears the name of this pioneer family. The community's pioneer educator, Joseph O. Flory, came to the village in 1840.⁴ Ringgold grew

slowly and except for two churches, the River Brethren and the Church of Christ, the village displayed few trappings of institutional and social growth. Clearly rural in character, the community's commercial endeavors were confined to a wagon shop, a blacksmith, and the store of C. Hoffman at the intersection of Barkdoll and Midvale Roads. By the 1890s, Ringgold had a population of only 199. Very little occurred to alter the community during the twentieth century. A new school for District 14 was built c. 1915; Colonial Revival in design, it is located on Windy Haven Road and was cut off completely from the historic core of the Village with the cut and rerouting of Route 64. A few newer homes were erected and a large addition was placed onto the Church of Christ. A significant change to the community occurred when a new Maryland Route 419 was built and bypassed the village to the south. Throughout its Period of Significance, the village remained an unindustrialized and uncommercialized hamlet, a character which it retains at the time of the preparation of this nomination.

Viewing Ringgold in the context of other nearby historic districts, this area can be compared and contrasted with the districts at Cavetown, Pen Mar and Highfield, in northern Washington County, with more urban districts in Hagerstown, the county seat, and with Fairplay, Tilghmanton, Sharpsburg, and Antietam Village in the southern reaches of the county. Ringgold most closely approximates character of Cavetown, with residential buildings, generally vernacular in character, existing in the setting of a rural hamlet with few embellishments of social maturity. Pen Mar does not possess the significant collection of historic residential architecture which is present in Ringgold, and that of Highfield dates from much later than Ringgold, during the period when that particular Blue Ridge Mountain resort community was growing early in the twentieth century. Tilghmanton and Fairplay contain vernacular and Federal-style domestic architecture similar to Ringgold. Sharpsburg is defined by a Main Street commercial area and distinct residential neighborhoods, all closely associated with the Civil War. The district at Antietam Village developed as an early company town related to an iron furnace and also is associated with a historic context related to the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal. Ringgold can claim none of these contextual links. The districts in Hagerstown are far more urban in character and include a substantial downtown area, which Ringgold does not possess. Ringgold stands as a locally-distinctive rural, agrarian, non-commercial and unindustrialized western Maryland village containing primarily vernacular domestic architecture dating from the 1820s through the 1920s.

Beginning at the northwestern corner of Misty Meadow Road and Midvale Road, then northwesterly along the west curbline of Misty Meadow Road c. 540' and following the south curbline of Misty Meadow Road an additional c. 390' to the west curbline of Barkdoll Road; then northerly along the west curb line of Barkdoll Road c. 420' to a point opposite the southwest property corner of the property at 14517 Barkdoll Road (Resource No. 32); then northeasterly along the southern property line of the property at 14517 Barkdoll Road c. 330' to the southeastern corner of the property at 14517 Barkdoll Road; then northerly along the rear lot lines of the properties facing Barkdoll Road c. 750' to the southeastern corner of the property at 14601 Barkdoll Road (Resource No. 39); then easterly along the rear property line of the property at 14601 Barkdoll Road c. 225 to the rear property line of the property located at 14601 Barkdoll Road; then northwesterly along the rear property lines of 146091 and 14607 Barkdoll Road (Resource Nos, 39, 40, and 41, respectively) c. 210' to the northeastern corner of the property at 14607 Barkdoll Road (Resource No., 41), then westerly along the north property line of 14607 Barkdoll Road, crossing Barkdoll Road, and continuing for a total of c. 660' to the northwest corner of the property at 14606 Barkdoll Road (Resource No. 1); then southwestly along the rear property liens of the properties facing Barkdoll Road c. 900' to a point; then c. 150' east to the northwest corner of the property at 14518 Barkdoll Road; then southerly a total of 1,590' along the rear property lines of the properties facing Barkdoll Road and crossing Midvale Road to the northwestern curbline of Midvale Road; then southwestly along the northwest curbline of Midvale Road c. 600' to the north curb line of Maryland Route 419; then easterly along the north curb line of Maryland Route 419 c. 540' to a point; then northeasterly c. 540' along the rear property lines of the properties facing Barkdoll Road to the southeast corner of the property at 23007 Midvale Road; then northerly along the east property line of 23007 Midvale road, and crossing Midvale Road a total of c. 150' to the north curb line of Midvale Road; then easterly along the north curbline of Midvale Road c. 540' to the place of beginning.

JUSTIFICATION

The boundaries of this nomination were selected to include the unincorporated village of Ringgold, including domestic architecture dating from the early decades of the eighteenth century through the early twentieth century, and also including a historic brick church and its associated cemetery. The boundaries were selected in order to include as much of the village as retains integrity of character and which dates from the Period of Significance, and to exclude areas which date from outside the Period of Significance or which have been significantly altered. The boundaries incorporate those properties which reflect the growth and prosperity of the village during its years of initial settlement and maturity.
