The Thomas B. Moore house is a good example of a late nineteenth century center hall/single-pile house extended to the rear with a dining room and kitchen wing. Estimated to date to around 1880-90, the cross-gabled house repeats an architectural form found throughout the Eastern Shore as well as entire state. The interior fittings of the house, including the stairs, door and window trim, doors, windows, and mantels have experienced few alterations. A rare feature for this property is the small burial plot in the backyard where Thomas B. Moore and his first wife, Rachel W. Moore and their daughter Mary Elizabeth Moore, are buried. pp Thomas B. Moore, the proprietor of a village store during the mid-to-late nineteenth century, financed construction of this house around 1880-90, perhaps after his wife Rachel died in 1887. Thomas B. Moore acquired this town property from a Mrs. Sarah L. Goslee, however the actual transfer has not been located. Thomas B. Moore was living on the property as early as 1877 since his residence is designated on the Quantico town map along with a store building. Thomas B. Moore and his second wife, May T. Moore, sold the Quantico property in 1895 to Winfield Scott Disharoon, however the Moore made a provision in the deed for future access to the burial plot where his wife and daughter were interred. W. Scott Disharoon died around 1915 and his widow Clara held onto the property until 1919 when she sold it to Eusebius Collier of Newark, New Jersey, who in turn sold it the following day to John D. Overton. The property remained in Overton family hands until 1989.

Historically identified as the Thomas B. Moore house, or more commonly called the Overton house, this two-and-a-half story, three-bay frame structure stands on the east side of Main Street in the center of Quantico, Wicomico County, Maryland. The center hall plan dwelling faces west with the gable roof oriented on a northwest/southeast axis.

Built around 1880-90, the two-and-a-half story, cross-gabled frame house, resting on a raised brick foundation, is sheathed with a layer of asbestos shingles. Asphalt shingles cover the steeply pitched gable roof which has extended eaves. A pair of narrow brick chimneys pierce the roofline. Attached to the back of the main block is a two-story, two-bay dining room wing, which is extended farther eastward with a single-story kitchen. Standing next to the house is a single-story outbuilding and in the backyard is a small Moore family burial plot surrounded by a decorative iron fence.

The west (main) facade is a symmetrical three-bay elevation with a center double-door entrance and flanking two-over-two sash windows. The paneled front doors are topped by a three-light transom. Three evenly spaced two-over-two sash windows light the second floor, and a round arched window pierces the cross gable. The north and south gable ends are marked by single two-over-two sash windows on each floor, and the upper gables are pierced by multi-pane sash windows.

The two-story rear wing is two-bays across with a single-story chamfered post porch stretching across the south side. On the south side a partially glazed door, flanked by a two-over-two sash window, opens into the dining room. The second floor is illuminated by two-over-two sash windows, and the base of the roof is finished with a boxed cornice. The south side of the kitchen is covered by the porch as well, which is enclosed at the east end as a pantry. A six-panel door with four replacement glass panels opens into the kitchen.

The interior of the house is relatively unchanged since the late nineteenth century. Fixed in the center hall is a turned baluster stair with a squarish newel post topped by an urn finial. The newel posts and turned balusters support a molded handrail. Four-panel doors in the house are framed by bulls-eye block surrounds, and factory-made mantels accent the fireplaces.

A single-story two-room frame outbuilding stands adjacent to the kitchen porch, and it rests on brick piers. The rectangular structure is sheathed with plain weatherboards and covered by a tin roof. The west room retains a faint layer of whitewash.

Centered in the backyard is the Moore family burial plot which is surrounded by a decorative iron fence. Buried in the small cemetery are Thomas B. Moore (b. October 10, 1823, d. August 3, 1902); Rachel W. Moore (d. July 16, 1887 at age 59 years, 11 months, and 11 days) and their daughter Mary Elizabeth Moore.

Due to its relatively well-preserved condition along with the Moore family cemetery, this property falls under Category B, which signifies a site that should be preserved as a structure exhibiting good architectural details representing a good example of architectural development and style, and supporting the character of the district.
