The Disharoon store is a prominent fixture in the center of Quantico. The gable-front frame structure, erected around 1890-1910 has an intact street elevation with a recessed double-door entrance and flanking display windows. The rectangular two-story front block is extended to the rear by an older mid nineteenth century store building that was probably moved back from the street or relocated from another site. The mid nineteenth century store is particularly significant with its unaltered features. A double-door entrance is flanked by large six-over-six sash window openings covered with paneled shutters. In addition, the wall retains an old red and white color scheme.

A full chain of title has not been established for this property, but for a large part of the twentieth century it was owned and/or operated by Elmer T. Disharoon or his daughter, Ethel and son-in-law, Herman F. Gordy.

The Disharoon store stands on the west side of Main Street in the heart of Quantico, Wicomico County, Maryland. The two-story, three-bay frame store faces east with the gable roof oriented on an east/west axis.

Dating from two different periods, the two-story gable-front main store building was built around 1890-1910, while a c. 1850-60 single-story store building serves as a rear wing. Supported on a low brick foundation, the entire building is sheathed with plain weatherboards. The front section is covered by a medium to low pitched tin roof with exposed rafter feet, while the rear wing has a steeply pitched roof with boxed cornices and a flush gable end. Attached to the south side of the rear wing is a shed roofed porch.

The east (main) elevation of the store is a symmetrical three-bay facade with a recessed entrance and flanking eight-over-eight display windows protected by iron bars. The double front doors are partially glazed. Sheltering the first floor is a shed roofed porch covered with corrugated tin and resting on metal posts. The second floor of the store is lighted by a pair of two-over-two sash windows. The eaves to the roof are extended with the soffits open and the rafter feet exposed.

The north and south sides of the main block are marked by asymmetrically placed two-over-two sash windows protected by metal bars. The west side of the main building is largely covered by the older single-story rear wing. A single-flue brick stack rises through the rear wing against the back wall of the main store building.

The south wall of the rear wing, the former front, is a three-bay facade with a double-door entrance and flanking six-over-six shuttered windows. The partially glazed front doors are topped by a three-pane transom that has a single horizontal iron bar. The entrance is framed by a plain surround topped by a heavy crown molding. The windows to each side have closed flush panel shutters kept in place by diagonal metal bar keepers. On the right (east) end of the rear wing is a wide corner pilaster that rises to a boxed cornice trimmed with bold bed and crown moldings. An old red and white paint scheme remains intact across the south wall.

The interior of the store retains much of its original finishes, although the first floor of the main block has new sheet paneling installed over the old beaded board walls. During the process of installing the sheet paneling a large portion of the store shelving was removed. A section of a shelving remains in the northwest corner, partitioned off the main storeroom by a new walls. Centered in the room are large chamfered posts that support the second floor.

As the best preserved of the remaining store buildings in Quantico, this structure falls under Category A, and must be retained since it is a structure of historic significance and/or exhibiting many good architectural details representative of a period of architectural development and contributing uniquely and superlatively to the character and collective value of the structures within the district.

Description (continued)

The second floor of the front block is reached by a stair that rises against the south wall with entrance through an exterior door off the back porch. The walls and ceiling of the second floor are covered with narrow beaded, tongue-and-groove boards. Fixed along the stairwell is a reused section of early nineteenth century handrail. Centered in the room are two chamfered post support posts.

The interior of the rear section is largely intact with wide horizontal beaded boards covering much of the wall surfaces. Mid-to late nineteenth century shelving and long counters with paneled fronts also remain in place. Access to the second floor of the older store building is gained through a doorway on the second floor of the front section. Primarily used for storage space, the store loft has wide pine flooring and a common rafter roof. Gable end weatherboards on the east side are covered by the late nineteenth century section.





