Historically labeled the Linwood Holliday house, this two-and-a-half story, five-bay frame dwelling is a large early twentieth century cross-gabled frame dwelling that stands on Church Street in the center of Whitehaven. The center hall house features gables with fishscale shingles and two-over-two sash windows light the first and second floors.

Construction of this cross-gabled dwelling is placed around 1915 when W. Linwood Holliday purchased this property, referred to as the "Flag Pole Lot," from William G. Catlin for \$100. He evidently improved the lot shortly after his purchase. Linwood Holliday and his wife Lyda sold the property six years later to Norman W. Dolbey, who retained title until his death in 1952, when the property passed to his wife Dora Dolbey. In 1960 the house and lot were sold to Rollie H. White, Jr. and his wife Doris Jean White. The Millers acquired the corner house and lot in 1991.

The Linwood Holliday house, commonly known as the Miller house or the Inez Jones house, stand at 2762 Church Street on the north side of Locust Lane in the village of Whitehaven, Wicomico County, Maryland. The two-and-a-half story, five-bay frame house faces east with the gable roof oriented on a north/south axis.

Dating to the early years of the twentieth century, the two-and-a-half story center hall frame house is supported on a low brick foundation, and the exterior is uniformly clad with aluminum siding. The steeply pitched cross gable roof is covered with asphalt shingles. Attached to the back of the single-pile main block is a two-story service wing. A frame garage and small frame outbuilding join the house on this corner lot.

The east (main) elevation is a symmetrical five-bay facade with a center entrance filled with molded four-panel front door topped by a single-light transom. Two-over-two sash windows flank the front door, and the center three bays are sheltered by a screened-in hip roofed porch supported on square posts. The second floor is defined by five two-over-two sash windows flanked by nailed on louvered shutters. Centered on the roof is a steeply pitched cross gable pierced in the center with a diamond-shaped window set within a field of fishscale shingles. The eaves are extended and covered with aluminum.

The north and south gable ends are largely alike with two two-over-two sash windows lighting the first and second floors to each side of interior end brick stove chimneys. The gable end itself is marked by a small attic window that has an arched header.

Attached to the back of the main block is a two-story, two-bay by one room kitchen wing extended on the south side by a shed roofed addition. An interior end brick chimney rises through the gable end and a single two-over-two sash window lights the kitchen.

The two-door frame garage stands on the north side of the house and a small gable-roofed frame outbuilding is located directly behind the kitchen wing.




