Estimated to date to the turn of the twentieth century, this Queen Anne style frame house is a fine example of late nineteenth century domestic architecture popularized through builders' trade manuals and popular literature of the period. The asymmetrical plan and exterior form featuring a high rooflines, projecting towers and bays, turned post porches with sawn decoration epitomizes the picturesque architectural qualities exposed by leading design theorists writing during the second half of the nineteenth century. By 1901, when this house was probably built, many of the building materials were premanufactured and shipped to Salisbury by train or steamboat.

Construction of the house is credited to Ida and William J. Morris. Ida E. Morris purchased this corner lot on April 6, 1901 for \$250, and ten years later she and her husband sold the property to William K. Perrin for \$4,250. The distinct increase in value and the Queen Anne architectural features comfortably place construction during the first decade of the twentieth century. The property name also recognizes the long-term ownership of the Holloway family, which began in 1919 and continued until 1960.

Historically known as the Morris-Holloway house, the two-story, asymmetrical Queen Anne style frame dwelling is located at 511 Poplar Hill Avenue in the Newtown District of Salisbury, Wicomico County, Maryland. The house faces west with the gable roof oriented on a north/south axis.

Built during the first decade of the twentieth century, c. 1901, the two-story, frame house is supported on a stretcher bond brick foundation with an excavated cellar. The Poplar Hill Avenue elevation presents what seems to be a story-and-a-half facade, but the house is actually two full stories with the long sloping front roof disguising its full height. The house is sheathed with a combination of weatherboard siding and fishscale shingles. Asphalt shingles cover the steeply pitched gable roof as well as the adjacent porch and two-story tower roof.

The west (main) facade is an asymmetrical elevation with a central entrance sheltered by a shed roof porch, which is a continuation of the main roof slope. The porch is supported by turned posts and trimmed with sawn corner brackets and a turned baluster railing. The partially glazed front door, topped by a single pane transom, is flanked on its right side by a colored glass round window. To the left of the porch is a three-sided square bay that supports a five-sided tower. The tower is capped by a five-sided conical roof, which blends with the main roof slope. The first floor of the tower is sheathed with horizontal weatherboards, whereas the upper floor is covered with shingles. Centered on the roof above the porch is a five-sided dormer covered with shingles and pierced by diamond-pane sash windows. Projecting through the gable roof are narrow brick stove chimneys.

The south side of the house rises two full stories with an attic. The wall is sheathed on the first floor with horizontal weatherboards and on the second floor and attic level with shingles. The shingles follow a wave pattern above the attic window. The first floor includes an off-center door and adjacent single-pane sash windows. The side door and east window are sheltered by a shed roof porch supported by turned posts. The second floor has an asymmetrical fenestration with a round window of colored glass combined with two single-pane sash windows. Lighting the attic is a Palladian window. The eaves to the roof are extended with the soffits enclosed.

The north gable end features a three-sided bay window on the first floor with an adjacent single-pane sash window. The second floor has a round window in the west bay and a single-pane sash window in the east bay. A Palladian window pierced the gable end.

A two-story, one-bay by one-bay addition extends from the back of the main block, and a shed roofed porch supported on turned posts shelters the rear entrance. Sawn corner brackets and a turned baluster railing are fitted between the posts.

The interior was not seen.




