The First National Bank of Maryland, formerly the Salisbury National Bank, occupies a prominent Beaux-Arts building located on a principal corner in the central business district. The colossal Doric columns rise to a large stone pediment featuring a shield and eagle emblem flanked with swags. The main entrance to the bank commands visual attention as well with its Ionic pilasters that rise to broken scrolled pediment. The main body of the bank is executed in Flemish bond brick with a molded watertable defining the base of the building. Large round arched windows stretch across the St. Peters Street elevation. The old Salisbury National Bank stands in stark contrast to two other contemporaneous bank buildings located on the opposite side of West Main Street. The former Farmers' and Merchants' Bank of Salisbury and the old Eastern Shore Trust Company both feature limestone facade executed in the Art Deco style.

The site on which the First National Bank stands is well known as the former location of the Peninsula Hotel, a large three-story brick building erected shortly after the 1886 fire. The Sanborn Insurance maps indicate that the first floor contained small shop space for a candy and jewelry stores as well as a dining room and kitchen. The upper floors were divided into hotel rooms. After the hotel burned in the mid 1920s, the directors of the Salisbury National Bank acquired the lot and financed the construction of

this prominent Beaux-Arts building. The building program of this impressive brick and stone bank was executed by the Tilghman Moyer Company of Allentown, Pennsylvania.

Prepare both a summary paragraph and a general description of the resource and its various elements as it exists today.

The First National Bank of Maryland is located at 201 West Main Street on the northwest corner of the intersection of West Main and St. Peter's streets in the central business district of Salisbury, Wicomico County, Maryland. The two-story, three-bay by six-bay brick building faces south.

Estimated to date around 1925-30, the two-story Beaux-Arts bank building is dominated by a colossal columned portico that fronts a rectangular Flemish bond brick block covered by a flat roof. The base of the building is defined by a molded watertable, and the principal corners feature brick quoins.

The south (main) elevation is defined by a series of four Doric limestone columns, and wall pilasters behind each column, that rise to a classical pediment. Centered on the front wall is the main entrance, which is framed by a large stone Colonial Revival frontispiece that features a broken scrolled pediment. Ionic pilasters rise to a cushion frieze. A carved pineapple is fixed in the center of the broken pediment. Located above the entrance arch is a multi-paned, round arched window that is accented with a soldier and rowlock arch fitted with a keystone at its center. Large twenty-four-pane windows are located to each side of the entrance and feature brick jack arches. Each arch as a marble keystone. The second floor of each side bay is marked by a squarish sixteen-pane window framed by a molded brick surround with crossetted corners.

The pediment is executed in stone and feature a dentiled crown molding. Highlighting the center of the tympanum is carved shield and eagle draped in flanking swags. The Flemish bond parapet wall above the pediment is capped with in stone. The soffit of the pediment has a paneled finish.

The west side of the bank is completely obscured by the adjacent commercial block. The east side, however, is fully exposed to St. Peter's Street. Six bays across, the principal corners are accented with brick quoins. Large, round arched window openings stretch two floors in height. Extending across the top of the windows is a stone cornice with a dentiled bed molding. Fixed above outside bays are stone panels with swag relief carvings.

The back of the building, which fronts West Church Street, contains a rear entrance on the northeast corner. A stone surround frames the glazed door entrance. Twenty-four pane windows pierce the rear wall, which is trimmed in a like manner to the rest of the building.

The interior was not seen.



The main entrance to the bank commands visual attention as well with its Ionic pilasters that rise to broken scrolled pediment. The First National Bank of Maryland is clearly eligible for listing in *Category A*, due to its high architectural integrity and principal location of this prominent downtown corner lot. The building stands in stark contrast to two other contemporaneous bank buildings that stand on the opposite side of West Main Street. The former Farmers' and Merchants' Bank of Salisbury and the old Eastern Shore Trust Company both feature limestone facade executed in the Art Deco style.


