The Albert H. Williams house has a distinct nineteenth century appearance due to the surviving fences that enclose this two-story, three-bay frame house located on the north side of the village of Nanticoke. A narrow picket fences distinguishes the front yard, while a wider pale fence encloses various sections of the back yard. The house is a tee-shaped structure with a center hall/single-pile main block extended by a two-story dining room wing. The interior finishes have remained essentially unaltered since the late nineteenth century. Unusual to the center hall on the first and second floor is a layer of lincrusta wainscoting topped by a plaster molding. Bulls-eye block surrounds frame the four-panel doors. Perhaps the most distinctive exterior feature and one unusual in Nanticoke is the two-story portico that survives with sawn balusters, corner brackets, and sawn eave decoration.

Chain of title research reveals that this property was purchased by Albert H. Williams during the late nineteenth century along with several other parcels that bordered the east and west sides of Nanticoke Road. The architectural features indicate the house was erected around 1880 and built in a single construction program.

The Albert H. Williams house is located at 20613 Nanticoke Road on the northern side of Nanticoke, Wicomico County, Maryland. The two-and-a-half story, three-bay, center hall frame house faces west with the main gable roof oriented on a north/south axis.

Built around 1880, the two-story, center hall, single-pile frame dwelling is supported by a low brick foundation, and the exterior is covered with vinyl siding. The steeply pitched gable roof is sheathed with asbestos shingles. Attached to the back of the house is a two-story dining room/kitchen wing. The house is joined on the lot by a two-story frame barn, a single-story, two-bay garage, an old chicken house, a pump house, and a privy. The yard is enclosed with picket fences.

The west (main) facade is a symmetrical three-bay elevation with a center entrance and flanking two-over-two sash windows. A two-story gable roofed portico shelters the center bay on each floor. Square porch posts are embellished with sawn brackets. The second floor is defined by a center partially glazed door and flanked by two-over-two sash windows. The base of the gable roof is finished with a boxed cornice.

The gable ends are alike with two-over-two sash windows on each side of interior end brick chimneys topped with a corbeled caps. Small two-over-two sash windows light the attic. The edge of the roof is finished with an extended eave and short returns at the lower corners.

The east elevation of the main block is largely covered by the two-story dining room wing with a shed roofed kitchen and enclosed porch extending eastward from it. The two-story, two-bay rear wing is extended on the south side by an enclosed shed roofed porch that incorporates the pantry. An interior end brick stove chimney rises through the gable end, and small two-over-two sash windows light the attic.

The interior follows a center hall/single pile plan. The hall contains the principal staircase and it is distinguished by a bold turned newel post and turned balusters that support a molded handrail. The stringer is embellished with a scroll decoration. Four-panel doors in each side wall are framed by bulls-eye block and fluted surrounds. Serving as a wainscoting is a layer of patterned lincrusta topped by a molded edge. The room on the south side features a rebuilt fireplace of brick from the second quarter of the twentieth century. The room on the north side retains a factory produced Victorian mantel. The north room has been partitioned to include a downstairs bathroom. The dining room retains a factory-made mantel as well as an enclosed stair that rises on the north side of the chimney pile behind a four-panel door. The second floor hall retains the lincrusta wainscoting as well as bulls-eye block surrounds that frame four-panel doors. An enclosed stair provided access to an unfinished attic.

The yard is enclosed by a variety of late nineteenth century fences. A narrow square picket fence with piers anchoring the gates encloses the front yard, while a wide pointed pale fence encloses the back yard. Fixed in the center of the backyard is an arbor. The outbuildings stand in a cluster on the northeast side of the property.






