Standing within a few dozen feet of the edge of the Nanticoke River, the Horner Brothers' store is a distinctive historic structure in this river community. Estimated to date around 1870-80, the two-story rectangular frame structure was built with its gable end serving as the principal facade in the same manner as many country store buildings. A wide double door entrance and flanking windows is sheltered by a generous hip roofed porch. Unusual to the Horner Brothers' store is a sizable two-story wing that extends eastward from the main block.

Russell and Nelson Horner operated their village store until 1987 after many decades of operating the business. Russell and Nelson's mother Ida and their older brother, Vernon, purchased the store property in March 1926 from Wade H. Insley following the death of the former store owner, George D. Insley. At the division of G. D. Insley's property in 1914, the surveyor, P. S. Shockley, delineated several tracts in the vicinity of Bivalve, then commonly known as Waltersville. The plat drawn for the estate settlement located the commercial property on "Lot 9" of "Plat No. 1" and the site was labeled "Store and Shirt Factory." G. D. Insley is located at this site on the 1877 Lake, Griffing, and Stevenson atlas, and he is identified in the atlas patron list as a merchant holding 60 acres. At the time of the trustees sale a long notice was

published in the *Wicomico News* stating that Wade H. And Cora R. Insley intended to offer at public auction “in the front of the storehouse formerly occupied by George D. Insley & Son, at Bivalve” several parcels including the Insley store and house. (See also WI-293)

The Insley and later Horner Brothers’s store was served by freight service by way of the steamboat landing during the nineteenth and twentieth centuries. A short section of railroad track stretched between the store and the wharf location, and a small hand cart was used to transport merchandise between the two locations.

Prepare both a summary paragraph and a general description of the resource and its various elements as it exists today.

The old Horner Brothers's store stands on the north side of Bivalve Wharf Road in the community of Bivalve, Wicomico County, Maryland. The two-story rectangular frame building faces south with the gable roof oriented on a north/south axis.

Dating around 1870-80, the two-story rectangular frame building is supported by a low brick foundation, and the exterior is clad with a combination of plain weatherboards and asphalt shingle siding. The steeply pitched roof is covered with asphalt shingles. Attached to the east side of the main block is a shorter two-story rectangular frame wing.

The south (main) facade is a gable-front elevation with a center double door entrance flanked by large size two-over-two sash windows. The entire first floor is sheltered by a hip roofed front porch, and the area under the porch survives with the plain weatherboard siding exposed. The second floor is marked by a pair of six-over-six sash windows. The gable end is trimmed with an extended eave and short returns finish the base of the roof.

The west side is a long wall pierced by two six-over-six sash windows on the first floor, while the second floor is a blind wall. An off-center brick stove chimney pierces the roofline.

The north gable end is pierced by a pair of six-over-six sash windows on the first and second floors, and a single six-over-six sash window is fixed within the gable end. The first floor windows are fitted with metal bars. The gable end eaves are extended and finished with a short return at the base of the roof.

The east side of the store is partially covered by the shorter two-story rectangular frame wing served by an off-center brick stove chimney. The east gable end of the wing is pierced by a center double door entrance and flanking six-over-six sash windows. The double door has diagonally nailed boards that create a chevron pattern. A Victorian latch survives on the right leaf.

The interior was not seen.


