19th and 20th centuries

Located at the confluence of Wetipquin Creek and the Nanticoke River, the village of Tyaskin developed on an undulating landscape of sandy ridges located along the south side of the creek. While life on these high, well-drained hills can be traced back to native American occupation, the development and growth of the village of Tyaskin is a more recent nineteenth century occurrence. The land on which the village developed was taken from several farms owned by the Riall and Larmore families. The old Larmore homeplace stood formerly near Hatcrown Point and survived until the early twentieth century. While it is uncertain when the essence of a village first took shape in the area, a distinct cluster of houses was in place by the third quarter of the nineteenth century. In 1877 a dozen houses along with a blacksmith shop and store are clustered on the south shore of Wetipquin Creek. In 1896 a large section of the Riall land bordering the county road was subdivided into small building lots, and a line of two-story, two- and three-bay frame houses were erected shortly afterwards. Occupied primarily by farming and working on the water, the village residents erected medium sized frame dwellings accented with cross gables and modest Victorian trim. Centrally located in the village is the Franklin B. Culver store, a late nineteenth century, gable-front frame building that served the community for a hundred years. Standing next to the store is the Franklin B. Culver house, one of the more elaborate structures erected

around 1885. The two-and-a-half story main block is a tee-shaped dwelling highlighted with a wraparound turned post porch and delicate Victorian sawnwork. Standing on the south side of the village is the Tyaskin United Methodist Church, a Gothic Revival frame building erected in 1894.

The village continued to grow during the first three decades of the twentieth century, and a handful of two-and-a-half story four-square and bungalow inspired dwellings were erected among the nineteenth century structures. The Ernest M. Larmore house is one of the best preserved examples of the popular four-square house form. The Larmore house is joined on its lot by a bi-level frame potato house erected in 1921. One of the most distinctive early twentieth century structures is the Mezick house, a story-and-a-half, round log dwelling built around 1934.

The community of Tyaskin is located on the south shore of Wetipquin Creek where it intersects the Nanticoke River. The village dwellings are largely oriented towards Tyaskin Road (MD 480), a north/south two-lane road that winds along a high ridge of land as it approaches Wetipquin Creek, the location of a beach, boat landing, and dock. The community is approximately fifteen miles west of Salisbury, Wicomico County, Maryland. Several properties are oriented to Tyaskin Wharf Road and a few side lanes.

The historic resources that define the village primarily date from the last quarter of the nineteenth century and the first half of the twentieth century. Principal among the sites that distinguish the village is the Tyaskin United Methodist (WI-305), built in 1894 for the Methodist Episcopal congregation. The structure is an asymmetrically designed Gothic Revival church enhanced by a tranquil setting among mature shade trees and a landscaped cemetery. Centrally positioned in the village are the old F. B. Culver store (WI-308), the F. B. Culver house (WI-310), as well as the old Tyaskin post office (WI-307).

The historic housing stock in Tyaskin follows common building forms for the late nineteenth century and early twentieth century. Two- or two-and-half story, two- and three-bay frame dwellings with cross gables and rear service wings are frequently seen, as are two-story, two-bay frame houses with shed roofed kitchens. A few dwellings retain decorative turn of the century features including turned post porches, eave decoration, and original sash windows. With its distinctive tee-shape and wraparound turned post porch the F. B. Culver house is one of the most elaborate and distinctive dwellings in the village. The two-story, gable-front Culver store is probably one of the oldest structures in the village, dating around 1870-80. Popularly built during the early twentieth century are several two-and-a-half story four-square dwellings distinctive for their blockish proportions and pyramidal roofs. The Ernest M. Larmore house (WI-311) is a particularly well preserved example of the house form. Between the two World wars, a number of recreational and summer homes have been erected. One of the most unusual is the Mezick house, a story-and-a-half round log structure built in 1934 of peeled pine logs with saddle notch cornering.

The village consists of approximately forty (40) standing structures that date between 1880 and 1940, the principal period of growth for watermen's communities such as Tyaskin.



 Surveyed January 15th and ended November 10th 1894




