Solid Flemish bond brick walls and a durable slate roof distinguish this two-and-a-half story, four-square dwelling located at 103 East Isabella Street in the Newtown Historic District. Historically known as the J. Waller Williams house and dating to the 1920s, the rectangular main block is extended by a hip roofed porch with arched openings in front and an enclosed porch to the east. Both porches are distinguished by a pierced brick railing. Also distinctive to the house are the round arched dormers that mark the medium pitched slate roof. Dating from the same period is a single-story hip roofed brick garage.

The early twentieth century design of the J. Waller Williams house provides an interesting architectural contrast to the mid and late nineteenth-century Victorian dwellings that dominate the north side of East Isabella Street. Immediately to the west is the prominently towered residence known as the Frederick Grier house and on the east is the mid nineteenth-century Italianate-inspired Toadvine house. The property on which J. Waller Williams erected his house was purchased in July 1920, and the house and lot were held by him until his death in 1959. J. Waller Williams was as an early automobile retailer in Salisbury.

The J. Waller Williams house stands at 103 East Isabella Street in the center of the Newtown Historic District in Salisbury, Wicomico County, Maryland. The two-and-a-half story four-square brick house faces south with the medium pitched hip roof oriented on a north/south axis.

Built around 1920, the two-and-a-half story, four-square dwelling has Flemish bond walls that rise to medium pitched hip roof covered in slate. Attached to the back of the house is a single-story kitchen wing. Standing northeast of the house is a single story brick garage dating from the 1920s as well.

The south (main) elevation is a two-bay facade with a side entrance filling the eastern of the two bays. An arched front entrance and an adjacent ten-over-one sash window are sheltered by a single story hip roofed porch covered in asphalt shingles. The porch roof is supported by a distinctive series of arched and square openings, and a pierced brick railing stretches between the vertical columns. The front entrance is fitted with a round arched glazed door. The second floor is pierced by a pair of eight-over-one sash windows flanked with paneled shutters. Accenting the Flemish bond wall on the second floor is a band of basketweave brickwork. The base of the roof is finished with a wide eave enclosed with a narrow tongue-and-groove board soffit. Piercing the roofline is a centrally placed brick chimney.

The east (side) elevation is defined by a three-bay facade with the first floor partially covered by a single-story, flat-roofed enclosed porch. Eight-pane casements pierce each wall of the enclosed porch, and the roof is surrounded by a pierced brick balustrade. A double French door opens onto the porch on the second floor. Although defined as a window opening, the center bay on the second floor is false and filled with brick. The northeastern window opening is filled with an eight-over-one sash window.

The west (side) elevation is a three-bay facade with eight-over-one sash windows lighting the first and second floors. The center bay on the second floor is a false opening filled with brick.

Attached to the back of the main block is a single story hip roofed brick kitchen. The roof extends on the east side to incorporate a square post porch.

The single-story brick garage is a hip roofed structure that stands on the northeast corner of the lot. The south wall is pieced by a row of garage doors, and the building is lighted by six-over-one sash windows.

The interior of the house was not seen.




