Historically identified as the William H. Knowles house, this prominent two-story, tee-shaped dwelling marks the corner of Main and State streets in the center of Sharptown. Enriched with an usually elaborate front porch that wraps around to the south side, the house actually dates from two distinct periods, the mid nineteenth century and the late nineteenth century. The northern two bays of the tee-shaped dwelling date around 1857 when George R. Knowles, a ship captain, purchased a small parcel of "Royal Exchange" from William K. and Sarah E. Elzey. A few Greek Revival details verify its mid nineteenth century date. The wide corner pilasters that define the northern corners of the house and a two-panel door to the attic are the few original finish elements that remain from the original construction. Around 1890-1900, William H. Knowles restyled his parents house in Victorian taste by adding a sizable cross wing oriented on a right angle to initial structure. The mid century house was refurbished at the same time.

William H. Knowles was a prominent businessman in Sharptown during the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. His first commercial venture was an association with W. W. Selby in a firm known as Knowles and Selby, which was established in 1885 and concentrated on undertaking and buildings. He entered into a larger concern in 1895 under the firm W. H. Knowles & Co., which dealt in the

wholesale marketing of nails, tacks, wires, crate hinges and hasps, as a wide variety of crates and baskets. The company's manufacturing plant was located along the Nanticoke River, and firm actually owned two wharves, one of which was used for sailing vessels and the other for a steamboat landing.

The William H. Knowles house is located at 701 Main Street in the southern residential district of Sharptown, Wicomico County, Maryland. The two-story asymmetrically planned frame house faces southwest with the principal gable oriented on a northwest/southeast axis.

Estimated to date to the third and four quarters of the nineteenth century, the two-story, tee-shaped frame dwelling is comprised of a two-story, side hall/parlor house dating around 1850-60 along with a sizable late 19th century cross wing addition that transformed the house into an asymmetrical, Queen Anne inspired residence. The entire structure is supported by a low brick foundation, and the exterior is clad with a combination of vinyl siding over plain weatherboards and fishscale shingles within the gable ends. The medium gable pitched roofs, finished with extended eaves, are covered with asphalt shingles. Attached to the back of the main block is a two-story kitchen wing.

The southwest (main) elevation is an uneven three-bay facade with a projecting pavilion on the south side and the entrance centrally located. The front door and first floor windows are sheltered by an elaborate turned post front porch that wraps around to the south side of the house. The front entrance, located in the second bay from the north, features a mid 19th century surround and a late 19th century Victorian door distinguished by colored glass panes. The adjacent windows have replaced with single-pane sash. The front wall of the projecting bay is defined by a three-sided bay window features knee wall exterior panels and single-pane sash windows. The turned post porch is enriched with a variety of sawn brackets and decorative panels carved with a sunburst pattern. Centered on the roof is a cross gable that marks the entrance bay. The front of the gable features pierced sawnwork. Missing from the front porch is a turned baluster handrail. Fixed to the southwest corner of the front wall is a wide paneled pilaster that identifies the corner of the mid 19th century dwelling. A series of brackets stretches across length of the house under a boxed cornice. The first and second floors are lighted by single-pane sash windows. The projecting pavilion features fishscale shingles within the gable end, and the extended eave has exposed rafter ends. The peak of the gable is embellished with decorative Victorian sawnwork.

Dominating the north gable end of the original house is late 19th century, two-and-a-half story, five-sided bay pavilion topped by a cross gabled hip roof. The cornice is trimmed with a series of sawn brackets and each corner has a drop pendant and turned spindle work. The south side of the pavilion is marked by paired single-pane sash windows on each floor, while single one-over-one sash windows mark each side. The two-story pavilion is incorporated under the eave of the main block, which has a Victorian peak decoration like the front gable. The rear (southeast) corner of the main block is also defined by a wide paneled pilaster.

7.1 DESCRIPTION

William H. Knowles House, WI-347
Sharptown, Wicomico County, Maryland

The south side of the house is a long uneven elevation of single-pane sash windows and the wraparound turned post porch. Situated atop the roof is a pair of cross gables sheathed with fishscale shingles. The east end of the porch is enclosed with a frame knee wall and glass panes.

The interior of the composite house retains a mixture of mid and late 19th-century woodwork, although the surviving elements of the original house have been diminished to relatively few pieces. The mid 19th century house followed a side hall/parlor or one-room plan. A 19th-century vertical board partition separates the current entrance from the living room. A single piece of beaded edge baseboard remains against the partition wall. Door and windows are trimmed with Victorian moldings. The present staircase rises between the front and back rooms of the late 19th century addition. Fixed atop the staircase is a turned newel post, a molded handrail, and a series of slender square baluster set on a diagonal to achieve a diamond shape.

Located on the second floor of the original house is an enclosed attic staircase that survives with a two-panel Greek Revival door. The unfinished attic reveals confirming evidence of the building sequence. At the head of the attic staircase is the former gable end tie beam, which has a series of empty pocket mortises in its top surface. The dimensions and finish of the rafters in the two sections distinctly differ, another indication of the generational gap in construction.

Standing on the northeast side of the house is a single-story gable roofed garage sheathed with a tin roof and plain weatherboard siding. The gable front wall is pierced by a wide door opening. The eaves of the building are extended and the soffits remain open.







