For the past half century this Mill Branch Road property has been known as the Franklin O. Tingle farm since he and his wife Edith A. Tingle purchased 80 3/4 acres in May 1944. The two-story, three-bay main block dates to the late nineteenth century and was probably built during the ownership of Elijah W. Bethard, who purchased two 40-acre parcels from the estate settlement of William C. Marsters in 1896. The Victorian era woodwork inherent in the turned baluster staircase and the mass-produced mantels on the first and second floors attest to the estimation of age. Attached to the back of the main block is an older story-and-a-half wing finished with third quarter of the nineteenth century woodwork. The former dining room features a mid century post and lintel mantel and an enclosed winder staircase that date around 1860.

Elijah W. Bethard and his wife Sarah sold the 80 3/4-acre farm in 1918 to William A. and Frank W. Chase of Fayette County, West Virginia. The same day William sold his interest in the property to Frank, who maintained ownership of the farm until a default on his mortgage in 1929 forced a public auction and sale of the property. Between 1933 and 1944 the farm was owned by Betty A. Church, who sold it to Franklin and Edith Tingle.

Prepare both a summary paragraph and a general description of the resource and its various elements as it exists today.

The Franklin. O. Tingle farm is located at 8684 Mill Branch Road near its intersection with Riggin Road south of Mardela Springs, Wicomico County, Maryland. The two-story, three-bay farmhouse faces northeast with the gable roof oriented on a northwest/southeast axis.

Built in two distinct periods, the Tingle farmhouse consists of a late nineteenth century two-story, three-bay, single-pile main block and a c. 1860-70 story-and-a-half rear wing that predates the front section. Supported on a low brick foundation the exterior is clad with artificial siding, and the steeply pitched roof is covered with asphalt shingles.

The northeast (main) elevation is a three-bay facade with a center entrance and flanking two-over-two sash windows. A four-panel front door is topped by two-light transom, and the entrance is sheltered by a single bay gable roofed porch. The porch roof has exposed rafter ends and is supported on square posts. Three two-over-two sash windows light the second floor. The edge of the roof is finished with exposed rafter ends and an open soffit. Rising through the center of the house is an interior brick stack that breaks the roof ridge on the north side of the center hall. A second center chimney stack was taken down and relocated to the south gable end. Two-over-two sash windows light the first and second floors on each gable end.

The southwest (rear) wall of the main block is partially covered by the story-and-a-half rear wing. Shed roofed porches, now enclosed, extend the two-room wing on each side. Protected by the porch are sections of plain weatherboard siding distinguished by circular saw kerf marks. Rising through the center of the wing is an interior brick chimney.

Inside the main block, the first and second floors are trimmed with late nineteenth-century woodwork. A center staircase features a turned newel post, turned balusters and a molded handrail. Plain door surrounds frame shallow profile four-panel doors. Factory produced Victorian mantels survive in each room, however the south room mantel has been repositioned in front of the relocated stove flue. The south hall partition was removed in order to provide for a larger living room. Original woodwork survives on the second floor as well. A turned baluster railing continues around the stairwell and meets an enclosed attic stair. Shallow four-panel doors are framed by plain surrounds. Bracketed Victorian mantel shelves remain in each bedroom.

The rear wing features third quarter of the nineteenth century woodwork. On the first floor there is a plain post and lintel mantel and an enclosed winder staircase in the northwest corner. Sawn lath is found throughout the rear wing.


