Placed on a gentle rise of land and built atop a raised brick foundation, the Alonzo L. Williams house is a prominent fixture along the stretch of Nanticoke Road between Salisbury and the road to Upper Ferry. The Colonial Revival inspired dwelling was designed on a generously sized center hall/double pile plan. The house was executed on a high standard with oak floors and high quality woodwork throughout eight principal rooms. Pocket doors originally separated the two front rooms front the center hall, which contains a turned baluster staircase executed with classical dentil moldings. Colonial Revival mantels frame the first floor fireplaces.

The land on which this house was built includes portions of tracts known as "Handy's Purchase" and "Spence's Choice," which Alonzo L. Williams acquired in 1888. His father farmed the land on the north side of Nanticoke Road on what was known as the "Home Farm." Alonzo L. Williams retained ownership of this prominent farm until 1919 when he sold the property to Carter Denson. Alonzo moved to Salisbury and acquired a third interest in the family's shipbuilding business.

The Alonzo L. Williams house is located at 27311 Nanticoke Road west of Salisbury, Wicomico County, Maryland. The two-and-a-half story frame house faces north with the steeply pitched hip roof oriented on an east/west axis.

Dating around 1911, the two-and-a-half story, center hall/double-pile frame dwelling is supported on a seven-course common bond foundation that was excavated to include a full cellar. The exterior is clad with plain weatherboard siding, and the steeply pitched hip roof is covered with asphalt shingles. Attached to the back of the original house is a single story garage. Also located on the property are several chicken houses, a brick foundation of a former bank barn, and several renovated houses as separate residences.

The north (main) elevation is a symmetrical three-bay facade with a center entrance and flanking twelve-over-one sash windows. The raised six-panel front door is framed by sidelights and a transom featuring x-shaped muntins. Each of the window and door openings have a slight cornice molding. Sheltering the entire front of the house is a two-story columned portico attached during the past thirty years. It replaced a single story Tuscan columned porch. The second floor is lighted by twelve-over-one sash windows. A paired set of twelve-over-one sash windows occupy the center bay. Fixed atop the roof is a large gabled dormer featuring twelve-over-one sash windows. The roof of the dormer is finished with a pediment front. Located to each side are pediment front gabled dormers filled with sixteen-pane windows.

The west side is two bays deep with twelve-over-one sash windows lighting the first and second floors. Louvered shutters flank the windows. Lighting the cellar are three-pane windows. An interior brick stack finished with a corbeled cap rises through the side wall.

The east side features a single-story screened in porch added during the past thirty years. Adjacent to the porch is a single-story bay window that is pierced by twelve-over-one sash windows. The second floor is lighted by twelve-over-one sash windows as well and a second brick chimney rises through the roof.

The north side is partially covered by a single-story garage and a two-story, one-bay wide rear ell.

The interior is divided into four main rooms that are disposed around a center stairhall. The front rooms are separated from the hall by large double door openings fitted with pocket doors. The doors to the west room have been removed. The floors are oak as is most of the interior woodwork. Framing the fireboxes are Colonial Revival mantels. The staircase has a square newel post topped by beveled edge caps featuring a dentiled bed molding. The newel post and a series of turned balusters support a molded handrail. The turned baluster railing continues around to the second floor attic stair. A few gas lines from the original lighting system remain in the house.
