Historically known as Cedar Grove farm, or by its tract name, "Wailes Retreat," this two-and-a-half story Victorian farmhouse stands on a slight knoll surrounded by level fields. Distinguished with extended eaves, decorated rafter ends, fishscale shingles, and a turned post front porch, the center hall/single-pile dwelling was erected around 1890 for Levin B. Weatherly (1856-1935), who his buried with other relatives in the small family plot along Spring Hill Lane. The house is joined on the lot by a group of late nineteenth-century and twentieth-century farm buildings.

The Weatherly farm was called Cedar Grove, however the tract that constituted much of the farm was patented as "Wailes Retreat" for Benjamin Wailes in 1796. By the third quarter of the nineteenth century, the farm was owned by Peter D. Weatherly (1805-1877). The farm, consisting of 165 acres, remained under Weatherly family tenure until the mid 1940s, when it was acquired by Lester C. and Beulah L. Serman. The farm remains in Serman family hands.

Cedar Grove farm, also known as the Serman farm, is located at 9231 Spring Hill Lane northeast of Hebron, Wicomico County, Maryland. The two-and-a-half story, three-bay, center hall frame dwelling faces west with the gable roof oriented on a north/south axis.

Built around 1880, the two-and-a-half story, three-bay, single-pile frame house is supported on a brick foundation, and the exterior is sheathed with aluminum siding. The steeply pitched cross gable roof is covered with asphalt shingles. Attached to the back of the main block is a two-story, three-bay dining room and kitchen wing, which extends farther east with a single story wing. The farmhouse is joined on the property by a turn of the twentieth century gable-front barn, and a two-story gable-front wagon house, as well as a single-story, single bay garage. A family cemetery is located along Spring Hill Lane.

The west (main) elevation is a symmetrical three-bay facade with a center entrance and flanking two-over-two sash windows. The partially glazed front door and the adjacent windows are sheltered by a single-story, cross-gabled, turned post porch enhanced with sawn brackets. The front of the cross gable is sheathed with vertical tongue-and-groove boards. Lighting the second floor are three evenly spaced two-over-two sash windows. The cross gable is pierced by a pointed arch two-over-two sash window, and a stick decoration embellishes the peak. The eaves of the house are extended and the soffits are open. The ends of the rafters are decorated.

The east and west gable ends are pierced by pairs of two-over-two sash windows to each side of interior end brick stove chimneys. The gable ends are sheathed with a layer of decorative shingles around small two-over-two attic windows.

The east (rear) wall is partially covered by a two-story, three-bay, dining room/kitchen wing, which is extended by shed roofed sections. The eaves are open and the rafter ends are decorated like the main block. Rising through the center of the service wing is an interior brick stack.

North of the house is a large turn of the twentieth-century gable-front barn supported on brick piers and sheathed with plain weatherboard siding. The first floor is defined by six-pane windows to each side of a large sliding door. The steeply pitched asphalt roof has extended eaves and open soffits. The roof extends on the west side to incorporate a side shed. The second floor of the barn is lighted by six-over-six sash windows.

The two-story wagon house stands west of the hay barn, and it is supported on a brick foundation, and the exterior is sheathed with plain weatherboards. The medium pitched roof is covered with asphalt shingles. A large wagon bay defines the first floor front.

Standing behind the house is a single-story, one-bay frame garage covered with plain weatherboards and topped by a medium pitched asphalt shingle roof.


