Incorporated within this two-and-a-half story frame dwelling is a two-story c. 1850-60 Greek Revival center hall/single-pile house that was turned around and reoriented with the construction of a large front addition around 1920. Original mid nineteenth-century woodwork finishes include the original turned baluster staircase and a Greek Revival mantel in the living room. Also surviving in the living room is a plastered cornice. The two-story kitchen wing, also dating to the mid nineteenth century, is entered through the original front door. The early twentieth-century addition follows a modified four-square design that is enhanced with Colonial Revival woodwork.

Known during much of the twentieth century as Cosquay Dairy Farm, this Rockawalkin Creek property was acquired by Lambert Adkins (1817-1857), great grandfather of the current owner, in 1850 when he moved from Powellville. Family tradition holds that there was a house on the property at the time, but the mid nineteenth-century woodwork of the Greek Revival dwelling suggests that it was erected after Lambert Adkins purchased the "Coscoway" tract from Edmund C. and Eglantine Horsey. Lambert Adkins, who died in his thirty-ninth year, predeceased his wife Clarissa (1822-1897) by forty years. The farm passed to their son Elijah James Adkins, who is designated at this location on the Lake, Griffing, and Stevenson atlas published in 1877. Most of the current farm buildings were erected during the tenure of Elijah James Adkins, who died in 1932. The large gambrel roofed barn is dated 1914. Also standing on the property is a two-and-a-half story dwelling-like

outbuilding that housed a dairy and bottling operation. Rare examples of Cosquay Dairy farm milk bottles are now collectors' items. The weatherboard frame dairy structure was built in the form of four-square house with its blockish shape and dormered roof.

Cosquay farm is located at 7890 Rockawalkin Road southwest of Hebron, Wicomico County, Maryland. The farm is bounded by Rockawalkin Road on the east and US Route 50 on the north. The house is oriented to face northeast with the gable roof placed on a northwest/southeast axis.

Built in stages between c. 1850-60 and c. 1920, the oldest part of the farmhouse is a two-story, center hall/single-pile, Greek Revival frame dwelling that was repositioned and incorporated into an early twentieth-century restyling of the house that included a large early twentieth-century addition. The original house was turned on its site with the original front joined to a two-story, one-room plan kitchen. The former back of the house was then covered and completely obscured by a large hip roofed addition designed in the four-square format. The house is supported on a brick foundation, and the exterior is clad with aluminum siding. The various hip, gable, and shed roofs are covered with asphalt shingles. Also standing on the property is a large gambrel roofed barn erected in 1914 and a two-and-a-half story dairy building built after the form of a four-square house as well.

The northeast (main) elevation of the house is a three-bay facade with a Tuscan columned porch stretching across the first floor. The east side of the porch has been enclosed. Centered on the front wall is a generously sized entrance framed by seven-light sidelights and a cross-patterned transom. The door is a replacement. The adjacent window features a cross-patterned transom window as well. The second floor windows have been replaced. Fixed atop the steeply pitched hip roof is a hip roofed dormer fitted with a triple set of multi-pane sash windows.

On the southeast side of the house the original pedimented gable end of the Greek Revival house remains visible. A rebuilt brick stack rises through the gable end. The northwest gable end, on the other hand, was restyled around the turn of the twentieth century with a Victorian bay.

Attached to the back of the house is a two-story, one-room plan kitchen wing, which is extended on two sides by single-story shed roofed additions.

The interior of the mid nineteenth-century house retains its original staircase and Greek Revival woodwork in the living room. The staircase features a heavy turned newel post and stick balusters that support a molded handrail. A Greek Revival mantel with tapered pilasters and a three-part divided frieze is fixed to the chimney breast, and the perimeter of the ceiling is enhanced with a plastered cornice.

## 7.1 DESCRIPTION

Cosquay Farm, WI-397

Hebron vicinity, Wicomico County, Maryland

The principal first floor rooms of the c. 1920 addition include a generously sized entrance hall and an adjacent parlor. The Colonial Revival staircase is defined by large square mahogany newel posts and rectangular balusters which support molded handrails. Located in the parlor is a corner fireplace accented by a Colonial Revival mantel with detached columns and a mirrored overmantel.

Located behind the house is a small family burial ground that contains several graves: Lambert Adkins (b. December 22, 1812, d. June 4, 1857), Clarissa L. Adkins (b. March 22, 1822, d. May 28, 1897), Fanny Adkins (b. March 17, 1853, d. December 4, 1853), Sally T. Adkins (b. March 18, 1855, d. March 24, 1889), and William H. Henry (b. September 3, 1832, d. October 8, 1862).

South of the house is the dairy and bottling plant, a two-and-a-half story frame structure supported on a common bond brick foundation and sheathed with plain weatherboard siding. The steeply pitched hip roof, marked by hip roofed dormers is covered with asphalt shingles. The first and second floors are lighted by two-over-two sash windows. Entrance to the dairy is gained on the southeast side. The door opens into the room used to wash bottles before filling them with milk. A line shaft, fixed within the side wall, was used for washing bottles.

The large gambrel roofed barn, erected in 1914, rests on a poured concrete foundation, and the exterior is clad with corrugated metal siding. The gambrel roofed is sheathed with green asphalt shingles. Metal lightning rods are fixed to the ridge of the roof. The gambrel roofed barn extends to the west with an ell addition.


