The Handy Brown house, which anchors the intersection of Second and Pearl streets in the west side neighborhood of Salisbury, follows along a traditional nineteenth century architectural form that was built throughout the Eastern Shore. Featuring a center staircase and single room depth, the frame dwelling is lighted by two-over-two sash windows and was heated by stoves.

According to family tradition Handy Brown is credited with the construction of this sizable house during his residency, which began in 1892 when he acquired what was known at the time as the "Disharoon Lot." Although the lot was improved at the time of sale, the property only transferred for \$350, which would not have included the cost of a house this size. For much of the twentieth century the house and lot have been owned by the Brown and interrelated Winder and Pinkett families.

Prepare both a summary paragraph and a general description of the resource and its various elements as it exists today.

The Handy Brown house, located at 137 Second Street, stands on the northeast corner of the intersection of Second and Pearl streets in the west side neighborhood of Salisbury, Wicomico County, Maryland. The two-and-a-half story frame house faces northwest with the gable roof oriented on a northeast/southwest axis.

Estimated to date around 1890-1900, the two-and-a-half story, three-bay, cross-gabled frame house is supported on a covered over brick pier foundation, and the exterior is clad with aluminum siding. Attached to the back of the main block is a two-story service wing.

The northwest (main) elevation is a symmetrical three-bay facade with a cross gabled, shed roof porch covering the first floor. The center entrance is fitted with a partially glazed front door, and to each side are two-over-two sash windows. The second floor is defined by three evenly spaced two-over-two sash windows, and the cross gable is pierced by a smaller sized two-over-two sash. The edge of the roof is finished with a slightly extended eave. The roofline is pierced by a pair of stuccoed brick stove flues that flank the center staircase.

The northeast and southwest gable ends are defined by single two-over-two sash windows on each floor. A two-over-two sash window lights the attic as well.

Attached to the back of the main block is a two-story service wing that is extended by shed roofed additions.

The interior was not seen.


