Standing at the west end of Second Street, is a two-story, side hall/parlor frame dwelling commonly known as the Purnell house, named for the family that has owned this property since the mid 1920s. Originally built on a brick pier foundation and lighted by two-over-two Victorian sash, the house was built around the turn of the twentieth century.

The lot on which this house stands was included in the large landing holdings of William S. Parsons, who operated a saw mill at the south end of Second Street during the third quarter of the nineteenth century. He held title to a large portion of this west side neighborhood when it was subdivided into smaller building lots. With its construction around 1900, the house was intended as a tenant property. In 1921 the house and lot were acquired by John Dorman, who passed the frame house and lot on to Luran L. Dorman.

The Purnell house, located at 102 Second Street, is a two-story, side hall/parlor frame dwelling located in the west side neighborhood of Salisbury, Wicomico County, Maryland. The house faces southeast with the gable roof oriented on a northeast/southwest axis.

Dating around 1900, the two-story, side hall/parlor frame house is supported on an infilled brick pier foundation. Rusticated concrete blocks were used as infill. The exterior is clad uniformly with aluminum siding. The steeply pitched roof is covered with asphalt shingles. Attached to the back of the main block is a two-story, two-bay dining room/kitchen wing.

The two-bay Second Street facade is defined by a side entrance and paired two-over-two sash windows on the first floor, which is sheltered by a single story hip roofed porch dating from the mid twentieth century. The porch roof is supported by square posts and the space between is infilled with a knee wall sheathed with aluminum siding. The second floor is lighted by a pair of evenly spaced two-over-two sash windows. Trimming the edge of the roof is a boxed cornice covered with aluminum as well.

The southwest gable end of the main block is defined by an asymmetrical fenestration with two small windows lighting the first floor and a single two-over-two sash window lighting the second floor. Rising through the gable end is a single flue brick stove chimney finished with a corbelled cap. The edge of the roof is finished with a slightly extended eave that terminates at the base with short returns. The northeast gable end is similarly detailed.

Attached to the back of the main block is a two-story, two-room plan service wing with an internal brick chimney piercing the roofline between the two rooms. Two-over-two sash windows light the first and second floors.

The interior was not seen.




