The chain of title research for this corner lot at the intersection of Hill and First streets traces the history of this two-story, early nineteenth-century house back to Benjamin H. Byrd (1805-1857), although the exact date of construction and initial ownership remain obscure. The side hall/parlor plan, the steeply pitched roof, and the Federal cornice that trims the base of the roof are convincing architectural details to date this house around 1815-20, making it one of a small number early nineteenth-century dwellings to remain in Salisbury. However, this house was probably moved to this corner location sometime after 1877 since it is not indicated on the Lake, Griffing, and Stevenson atlas. This house, nor the south end of Third Street below Hill Street, were included on the Salisbury map, thereby suggesting its relocation during the last quarter of the nineteenth century.

Following Benjamin H. Byrd's death in 1857, the property fell to his wife Henrietta (1811-1890), and then to their grandchildren Ernest Byrd and Annie T. Byrd. It is uncertain when Benjamin H. Byrd acquired this parcel.

On July 2, 1909 the house and lot were acquired by Azariah Hillman, who is listed in the 1907 Salisbury City directory as a gardener. Azariah and his wife Olevia retained ownership until 1914. Older residents of the neighborhood recall Hillman's Store which was located on the corner with the house. Since the early twentieth century the property has transferred a half dozen times.

Prepare both a summary paragraph and a general description of the resource and its various elements as it exists today.

Historically identified as the Benjamin H. Byrd house, and also known as the Azariah Hillman house, this two-story, three-bay side hall/parlor frame dwelling stands at 610 Hill Street in the west side neighborhood of Salisbury, Wicomico County, Maryland.

Estimated to date around 1815-20, the two-story, side hall/parlor frame house is supported on a covered brick pier foundation, and the exterior is sheathed with vinyl siding. The steeply pitched gable roof is covered with asphalt shingles. Attached to the back of the main block is a single-story kitchen wing.

The northeast (main) facade is a three-bay elevation with a side entrance and flanking single-pane replacement windows that fill the adjacent bays. The second floor is lighted by three single-pane sash replacement windows. Trimming the base of the gable roof is a boxed cornice enhanced with a Federal style cove bed molding.

The northwest gable end is defined by single-pane sash replacement windows on each side of an interior end brick chimney. The flush gable end is finished with a plain bargeboard. Rising through the peak of the gable end is a rebuilt brick chimney that dates to the early twentieth century.

The southeast (rear) wall of the main block is partially covered by the single-story kitchen wing, which is extended on its north side by a shed roofed addition. An interior end brick chimney rises through the gable end.

The interior was not seen, but the house was thoroughly remodeled for the purposes of a rental.




