This finely detailed neo-Federal brick dwelling was designed by Salisbury architect Wilson Booth for Thomas H. Mitchell, Jr. and his wife Margaret R. Mitchell. Following a traditional architectural form for the region with a side entrance two-story, three-bay by one room main block, the brick exterior is finished in a particularly high level of intricate detail. The front entrance is enhanced by a gable roofed pediment that incorporates an unusual shell carved recess over the door. The pediment is enriched with modillion blocks and as well as a finely carved bed molding. To each side of the door are fluted pilasters that rise to frieze blocks embellished with carved oval medallions. The south facade is further distinguished by even rows of eight-over-eight sash windows and a highly intricate boxed cornice. Tapered modillion blocks and a Wall-of-Troy bed molding accent the boxed cornice, which incorporates a built-in gutter. The ends of the main block as well as the story-and-a-half wing are dominated by exterior brick chimneys featuring corbelled bases.

Thomas H. Mitchell, Jr., proprietor of the Salisbury Brick Company, financed construction of this well-designed dwelling on the former Jackson family estate known as "The Oaks," which was subdivided following the destruction of the sprawling Jackson house.

The Thomas H. Mitchell, Jr. house is located at 507 Park Avenue in Salisbury, Wicomico County, Maryland. Built on a slight knoll, the two-story, side hall/parlor brick house faces south with the gable roof oriented on an east/west axis. The house stands on the former Jackson estate known as "The Oaks."

Built in 1935, the two-story, three-bay brick house is supported on a brick foundation, and the side hall/parlor house is covered by a medium pitched slate roof. Attached to the east gable end is story-and-a-half wing. The entire house is painted white.

The south facade of the three-bay main block is defined by a side entrance and flanking eight-over-one sash windows. The raised six-panel door is framed by an elaborate neo-Federal surround with fluted pilasters rising to a gable roofed pediment enriched with a modillion block cornice and a finely carved dentil block bed molding. In lieu of a transom, the area over the door and under the pediment is filled with a carved shell recess framed by a round arched surround. The doorway has raised panel reveals as well. The adjacent eight-over-eight sash windows are fitted with molded surrounds and raised panel shutters. The second floor is lighted by three eight-over-eight sash windows of slightly smaller dimensions than the first floor openings. The windows are framed by molded surrounds and flanked by louvered shutters. The base of the roof is finished with a delicately crafted modillion block cornice not unlike the cornice executed on the Wailes Law Office at 116 East Main Street. The boxed cornice includes an interior gutter system, and the cornice is underpinned by a row of tapered blocks. A secondary Wall-of-Troy molding stretches across beneath the modillion blocks.

The west gable end is dominated by an exterior chimney stack with a corbelled base. The chimney is flanked on each floor by eight-over-eight sash windows on the first and second stories. Quarter round windows with web-pattern muntins light the attic. The gable end is flush and trimmed with a molded bargeboard.

The east gable end is largely covered by the story-and-a-half wing, which is three bays across by one room deep. A shed roofed porch with square posts and segmental arches between them shelters a center door and flanking six-over-six sash windows. The windows retain raised panel shutters. The half story is defined by a pair of gable roofed dormers that interrupt the roofline and are fitted with six-over-six sash windows. A small window flanked with louvered shutters pierces the half story between the dormers.

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The east gable end of the wing is dominated by an exterior brick chimney featuring a corbelled base and a slightly corbelled cap. Above the wing and piercing the gable end of the main block is a round arched attic window. The gable end is flush and finished with a molded bargeboard.

The interior was not seen.


