Marking the northeast corner of Camden Avenue and North Boulevard is a large two-and-a-half story Queen Anne dwelling erected during the early twentieth century for Jesse E. and Rosa M. Guthrie. The squarish main block is accented with a three-story conical roofed tower and a tapered post porch that wraps around two sides. Pavilions, bay windows, and cross gables sheathed with a combination of plain weatherboards and shingles contribute to the asymmetrically planned features that enrich the center hall dwelling. The edges of the house roof, porch roof, and conical tower are trimmed with block cornices that add another layer of textural interest to the exterior. Little changed since the early twentieth century, the Queen Anne dwelling contributes to the historic nature of the Camden Avenue district.

Construction of the house is dated around 1914 when Rosa M. Guthrie acquired a lot along Camden Avenue from the Camden Realty Company. After a short four-year term of ownership, the Guthries sold the house and lot to Merrill H. Tilghman of Richmond, Virginia for \$6,000, which indicates that substantial improvements had been made to the property. The Guthrie house remained in Tilghman family hands for two years. In 1920 the house and lot were acquired by Salisbury attorney and later judge Levin Claude Bailey. The property remains in Bailey family ownership.

The Judge Levin Claude Bailey house is located at 723 Camden Avenue in the Camden neighborhood of Salisbury, Wicomico County, Maryland. The two-and-a-half story Queen Anne style frame dwelling faces west with the steeply pitched hip roof oriented on a north/south axis.

Built around 1914, the two-and-a-half story Queen Anne frame house is supported on a raised brick foundation, and the exterior is clad with a combination of plain weatherboards and wood shingles. The steeply pitched hip roof is covered with asphalt shingles. Standing behind the house is a single-story frame garage.

The west (main) facade is an asymmetrical three-bay elevation with a three-story round tower dominating the southwest corner. The first floor is sheltered by a single-story porch which wraps around the south side. The front wall of the house has a centered entrance. The horizontally paneled front door is framed by a multi-pane transom and four-light sidelights. Flanking the entrance to the left (north) is a tripartite series of single-pane sash windows, and to the right (south) is a single one-over-one sash window. The tower is pierced by single-pane sash windows as well. Sheltering the first floor is a hip roofed porch supported on tapered square posts with paneled sides. A rectangular baluster handrail stretches between the posts. The entrance bay to the porch is defined by a cross gable, and the gable-front is sheathed with shingles. A series of blocks mark the porch cornice. The brick foundation of the porch is pierced by a diamond pattern vent. The second floor is defined by a tripartite series of single-pane sash windows in the north bay and two individual single-pane sash windows in the center and south bay. Fixed atop the hip roof is a cross gable pierced by a Venetian style window set within a field of wood shingle siding. Trimming the base of the house roof is a block cornice. The conical roofed tower features a block cornice as well.

The south side of the house is an asymmetrical elevation with an off-center two-story pavilion with a gable front enclosed with a pediment. All three floors are lighted by single-pane sash windows. The porch on the south side is glazed.

The north side of the house is defined by single-story bay windows lighted by single-pane sash. Internal brick stack pierce the roofline.

The interior was not seen.

Marking the northeast corner of Camden Avenue and North Boulevard is a large two-and-a-half story Queen Anne dwelling erected during the early twentieth century for Jesse E. and Rosa M. Guthrie. The squarish main block is accented with a three-story conical roofed tower and a tapered post porch wraps around two sides. Pavilions and cross gables sheathed with a combination of weatherboards and shingle siding contribute to the asymmetrically planned features that enrich the center hall dwelling. The edges of the house roof, porch roof, and conical tower are trimmed with block cornices that add another layer of textural interest to the exterior. Little changed since the early twentieth century, the house contributes to the historic character of the Camden Avenue district.

Construction of the house is dated around 1914 when Rosa M. Guthrie acquired a lot along Camden Avenue from the

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Camden Realty Company.¹ After a short four-year term of ownership, the Guthries sold the house and lot to Merrill H. Tilghman of Richmond, Virginia for \$6,000, which indicates the substantial improvement made to the property.² The Guthrie house remained in Tilghman family hands for two years. In 1920 the house and lot were acquired by Salisbury attorney and later judge Levin Claude Bailey.³ The house and lot have remained under Bailey family ownership.


