The Glass Hill School is located on the west side of Maple Street in the center of Pittsville, Wicomico County, Maryland. The single story, one-room plan frame school was moved to this site during the 1980s by Jim Jackson, the present owner. Since the move it was restored and converted into a small antique shop. The school building faces east with the gable roof oriented on an east/west axis.

Dating around 1870, the single-story, gable-front frame school is supported on a concrete block foundation, and is sheathed with a combination of original and modern board-and-batten siding. The rectangular frame structure is covered by a medium pitched asphalt shingle roof.

The east (main) elevation is a one-bay elevation with a center entrance flanked by board-and-batten walls. The entrance is fitted with a vertical board door. The edge of the roof is finished with an extended eave and a sloped soffit.

The north and south sides are essentially alike with a pair of six-over-six sash windows fitted with board-and-batten shutters. A single-flue brick stack pierces the north side of the roof.

The west (rear) wall is defined by a single six-over-six sash window opening flanked by a board-and-batten shutter.

The interior has been restored with modern wall board above a board wainscoting that trims the perimeter of the room below the window sill. Several of the windows retain a ogee backband molding.





 Pittsville, MD Quadrangle 1942




CONTOUR INTERVAL 20 FEET
