For the past thirty years this property southeast of Mardela Springs has been known as White Chimneys, a name inspired by the tall exterior brick stacks that dominate the gable ends of this two-story, three-bay frame dwelling. Estimated to date around 1830, the mortise-and-tenon timber frame house is sheathed with a layer of beaded weatherboards and covered by a steeply pitched wood shingle roof. The west gable end retains a early nineteenth century, nine-course common bond brick stack that has corbeled shoulders at the second story level. The east gable end chimney was rebuilt when the house was restored and enlarged during the mid 1970s. Structural evidence found during the restoration indicates that the house was built in two stages, beginning with the eastern two-thirds of the three-bay dwelling. The interior is finished with late Federal woodwork associated with the second quarter of the nineteenth century. The house achieved its full three bay form within ten to fifteen years of initial construction.

During much of the nineteenth century this farm was held by Robert D. Robertson, who is listed in the 1850 United States census for Somerset County as a relatively well-off farmer in Barren Creek election district. At fifty-six years old, Robert D. Robertson was grouped with his wife, Susan M. Robertson and six children, Susan A., aged 21; George T., aged 18; Martha E., aged 15; Annie G., aged 14; Mary C., aged 12; and lastly John C. Robertson at aged 10. R. D. Robertson is also designated on the Barren Creek map of the Lake, Griffing, and Stevenson atlas

published in 1877. In 1893, Annie Robertson purchased the 93-acre farm from her siblings and retained title until 1924.

By 1968 the Federal farmhouse was in a poor state of repair, and the present owners purchased the house and 25 acres. Over the course following few years the house was restored and a modern addition was designed and built to the rear. The modern or contemporary aspect of the rear wing was conceived in compatible fashion that clearly distinguishes the old house from the new wing, and at the same, the design provided the new addition with a distinct character all its own. Also standing on the property is another early nineteenth-century structure, a frame dairy that is located off the southeast corner of the old house. Large louvered vents pierce each side of this weatherboard frame structure that retains a few pieces of beaded siding.

White Chimneys is the name of a rural property located on the south side of Riggin Road, southeast of Mardela Springs, Wicomico County, Maryland. The two-story, three-bay frame dwelling faces northwest and the principal gable roof is oriented on a northeast/southwest axis.

Estimated to date around 1830, the two-story, three-bay frame house is supported by a low brick foundation, and the exterior is sheathed with original beaded weatherboards. The steeply pitched gable roof is covered with wood shingles. Attached to the back of the house is a modern (1974-95) addition. Standing in the yard directly adjacent to the house is an early nineteenth-century frame dairy.

The northwest (main) elevation is a three-bay facade with a center entrance and flanking six-over-six sash windows. The six-panel front door is topped by a four-light transom that is a later addition. The door and window openings are framed by a narrow beaded edge surround. The second floor is lighted by slightly smaller sized six-over-six sash windows also framed by a narrow beaded edge surround. Trimming the base of the roof is a boxed cornice enhanced with early nineteenth-century bed and crown moldings.

The west gable end is dominated by a large nine-course common bond brick exterior stack finished with corbeled shoulders at the second story height. Six-over-six sash windows flank the stack, and small two-over-two sash windows light the attic. The gable end is flush and trimmed with beaded edge bargeboards.

The northeast gable end has a rebuilt exterior brick chimney with six-over-six sash windows to each side and small two-over-two sash windows light the attic.

The rear (southeast) wall is entirely covered by the modern addition, which has been built in stages between 1974 and 1995.

The interior of the old house is fitted with Federal woodwork distinctive to the 1830s. Six-panel doors are framed by narrow molded surrounds. The backband has a finely executed Greek ovolo profile to the round. The stair rises between the two rooms without a center passage. At the head of the staircase a second floor railing is anchored by a chamfered edge newel post. Narrow stick balusters support a circular profile handrail common to the second quarter of the nineteenth century.

Federal chair rail moldings and trim the perimeter of the rooms. Enhancing each front room is a Federal mantel with plain pilasters and a five-part frieze that supports a delicately molded and broken profile shelf.

The dairy is a single story gable roofed frame structure that stands on the southeast side of the modern wing. The building is sheathed with a combination of plain and a few remnant beaded weatherboards. The front (northeast) wall is pierced by a six-panel door, and the north and south sides have a large louvered vent. A six-over-six sash window marks the rear wall.

This property qualifies for listing in *Category A*, which identifies buildings of high architectural and historical merit. Due to the scarcity of ante-bellum dwellings in Barren Creek election district, this house deserves listing on the National Register of Historic Places.


