The two-and-one-half story Victorian house that stands on the southeast corner of Camden and Maryland avenues follows a conventional pattern for many dwellings erected around the turn of the twentieth century. Typical of many examples of the style, a two-story pavilion projects forward of the main block, and spindle decoration enriches a semi-octagonal, first floor bay. Extending from the northeast corner is a plain two-story, one-bay pavilion. In between the two pavilions is a single-story Tuscan columned porch.

Listed as a "carpenter" in the 1907 Salisbury City directory, Merrill W. Abbott most likely built this house for himself and his family. Included in the directory listed with Merrill was his wife, Lillie, and daughter Edith, a student. Merrill family occupation of the house lasted until 1945, when the house and lot were sold to John C. and Irma B. Mason, who turned around and sold it to Walter H. and Otie W. McAllen a little over two months later. The McAllen ownership continued for twenty years, until Otie McAllen, a widow, transferred title to Sigmund and Beverly Muskat. The current owners acquired the property in 1976.

The Merrill W. Abbott house is located on the southeast corner of Maryland and Camden avenues with an address of 609 Camden Avenue. The house faces west with the hip roof oriented on a north/south axis.

Built around 1901, the two-and-a-half story, asymmetrical plan Victorian house is supported on a low brick foundation, and the exterior is clad with plain weatherboard siding. The steeply pitched hip roof, with several gable roof pavilions extending from it, is sheathed with asphalt shingles.

The west (main) elevation is an asymmetrical facade with an uneven ell-shaped front. Centrally located in the main block, the front entrance is sheltered by a Tuscan columned front porch that wraps around the north end. The partially glazed front door includes colored glass panes. The adjacent bay to the north is filled with a two-over-two sash window. Flanking the entrance on the south is a projecting two-story pavilion with a three-sided front defining the first story. Each face of the semi-octagonal bay is pierced by a two-over-two sash window. The second story of the pavilion has square sides and is pierced by a paired multipane window. Enriching the soffit at each corner of the pavilion is a spindle decoration. Fixed in the gable end is a six-over-one sash window. The edge of the roof is finished with an extended eave and exposed rafter tails. Rising through the center of the house are single flue brick stacks topped by corbelled caps.

The south side of the house is marked by pairs of two-over-two sash windows that light the first and second floors, and the edge of the roof is finished with an extended eave and exposed rafter tails.

The north side is defined by a projecting two-story, one-bay, gable-roofed pavilion pierced by single two-over-two sash windows on each floor.

The rear wall is an asymmetrical elevation also with a two story shed roofed section fixed in the corner. A single-story back porch with turned posts and a shed roof are attached to the southeast corner of the main block.

The interior was not seen.


