Public worship

The most idiosyncratic landmark to distinguish the village of Powellville is the twin towered Methodist church standing along Mt. Hermon Road. Both structures were moved to this common location and joined together to use of the two churches as a single facility. The eastern half is the former St. John's M. E. Church, erected in 1916, according to E. C. Hallman's *Garden of Methodism*. The western half was White's Chapel, formerly located between Powellville and Whiton. Both structures were moved to this site and positioned side by side with a Sunday School room, kitchen, and support spaces houses in the building in between. The St. John's church houses the sanctuary, whereas the former White's Chapel serves as a multi-purpose meeting and dining room. Each building is lighted by a series of early twentieth-century colored glass windows. Fixed above the interior door of the St. John's Church is a colored glass transom with the name figured in the design.

The Powellville Methodist Church is located on the north side of Mt. Hermon Road on the west side of the village of Powellville, Wicomico County, Maryland. The church consists of two early twentieth-century gable-front frame structures moved to this location and joined together as one facility. The church faces southwest with the principal gable roofs oriented on a northeast/southwest axis.

The southwest (main) elevation of the eastern structure, originally known as St. John's, is a single-story gable-front elevation with a two-story entrance and bell tower centered on the wall. The structure rests on a low brick foundation and it clad uniformly with vinyl siding. The steeply pitched gable roof is covered with a layer of metal. The tower is defined by a double-door entrance on the first story and a rectangular louvered vent on the upper story. The tower is topped by a squat broach spire. Flanking the tower are tall colored glass windows of figurative designs. Finishing the edge of the roof is a slightly extended eave with returns at the base of the roof.

The east side elevation of St. John's is defined by three rectangular colored glass windows, and a small cross gable is located atop the gable roof. The west side elevation is defined by rectangular colored glass windows of figurative designs as well and a small cross gable is fixed atop the roof.

The northeast (rear) wall of the church is largely covered by the mid twentieth century addition.

The interior has been remodeled with sheet paneled and beaverboard, but the ceiling retains a cove cornice. An arched opening provides access to an altar area fronted by a semi-circular, turned baluster handrail. Two colored glass windows with figurative designs light the altar.

The western half of the church, originally White's Chapel, is used as a meeting hall, and it is similar in design to St. John's with a projecting two-story entrance tower fronting a single-story gable-front main block. The church hall is supported on a low brick foundation, and the exterior is clad uniformly with vinyl siding. The steeply pitched gable roof is sheathed with asphalt shingles. The entrance tower has a double-door entrance with a rectangular colored glass transom above. Defining the upper level is a diamond-shaped window filled with colored glass as well. The tower is capped by a short broach spire that rises above a square base. The entrance tower is flanked on each side by rectangular colored glass windows. The sides of the church hall are marked by three rectangular colored glass windows. The northeast (rear) wall of the church hall is largely covered by the single-story mid twentieth century addition that houses the kitchen.


