The Hooper S. Miles house is a prominent Colonial Revival, Flemish bond brick dwelling that enhances the corner of Park Avenue and West Isabella Street in the Newtown Historic District. The solidly built brick dwelling was designed and crafted on a high level with elaborate exterior and interior finishes. Erected around 1923, the center hall plan dwelling has a formal entrance marked by a well-detailed portico. Framing the entrance are leaded glass sidelights and a leaded glass transom. To each side of the front entrance are tripartite windows enhanced with an arched brick decoration. The steeply pitched gable roof is distinctive as well with its series of arched dormers, slate covering, and Wall-of-Troy bed molding that enriches the boxed cornice. The double-pile main block includes single-story side wings that house an enclosed porch on the south and a library to the north. One of the most elaborate interior finishes is the turned baluster staircase, which rises in several flights with ramped handrails. Joining the house on the corner lot is a finely built Flemish bond brick garage distinctive for its Colonial Revival gambrel roof.

Attorney Hooper S. Miles and his wife Frances W. Miles financed construction of this Flemish bond brick dwelling around 1923 when her mother, Georgia F. Williams, died and left the lion share of her estate to her daughter and son-in-law. Georgia F. Williams was the widow of L. Ernest Williams, who operated a large lumber and woodworking concern located on Salisbury's waterfront around the turn of the twentieth century. Hooper S. Miles was a senior partner in the firm of Miles, Bailey & Williams, and he held another prominent position as an executive vice-president of the Baltimore National Bank. Hooper and Frances Miles sold the Park Avenue house in 1938 after they had relocated to Baltimore. The house and lot were transferred to S. Houston Todd, in whose hands the property remained until 1962. Elizabeth Todd Helfrich and her husband Thomas sold her parents home to J. Hooper and Shirley H.

Parrott, who retained ownership for nearly thirty years. The current owner acquired the corner property in 1991.

The Hooper S. Miles house, also known historically as the Houston Todd house, is located at 406 Park Avenue, a prominent corner lot on the southwest corner of the intersection of Park Avenue and West Isabella Street in the Newtown Historic District of Salisbury, Wicomico County, Maryland. The two-and-a-half story, Colonial Revival, center hall plan brick house faces east with the principal gable oriented on a north/south axis. Joining the house on the lot is a story-and-a-half gambrel roofed brick garage. The lot is also distinguished by an iron fence.

Dating around 1926, the two-and-a-half story, three-bay, double-pile main block is supported on a fully excavated brick cellar of seven-course common bond walls. Above grade the brick pattern changes to Flemish bond. The Flemish bond walls rise to steeply pitched gable roof sheathed in slate. Attached to each end of the house are single-story wings erected at the same time as the main block.

The east (main) façade is a symmetrical three-bay elevation with a center entrance enhanced by a neoclassical portico. Tuscan columns support a gable roof trimmed with bold modillion blocks. The eight-panel front door is framed by a leaded glass arched transom and leaded glass sidelights. To each side of the front door is a half round fluted pilaster. The entrance is flanked to each side by tripartite windows. An eight-over-eight center window is flanked by narrow four-over-four sash windows. The first floor windows are also enhanced with decorative brickwork. Jack arches span the window openings, and a half-circle arch is included in the brickwork over the center sash. The first floor windows are flanked by paneled shutters that feature an urn-shaped cut-out in the top panel. The second floor is lighted by eight-over-eight sash windows with jack arches spanning the openings. Finishing the base of the roof is a box cornice which has a built-in gutter. The cornice is enriched with a Wall-of-Troy bed molding. Fixed atop the slate roof are three segmental arched dormers fitted with casement type windows. The sides of the dormers, like the roof, are covered in slate.

The north gable end is partially covered by a single-story hip roofed wing, also erected in Flemish bond. The wing is two-bays across by one room deep, and the rooms are lighted by eight-over-eight sash windows. The wing covers the first floor, whereas an exterior/interior brick stack rises in the center of the gable end with eight-over-eight sash second floor windows to each side. The window openings are spanned by a jack arch. Piercing the gable end are a pair of quarter round window openings, one to each side of the brick stack. The chimney is finished at its top with a corbelled cap.

The south gable end is covered on the first floor by an enclosed porch featuring a flat roof and a rooftop balustrade. The porch features large window openings on each side as well as a fully glazed door on its east end. The second floor of the main block has fully glazed door openings that provide access to the porch roof. The third floor has quarter round attic windows to either side of the exterior/interior brick chimney.

The west (rear) façade has a center door accented with a neoclassical pediment, and large tripartite windows light the first floor rooms. The tripartite window openings are spanned by jack arches. The rear wall surface also features a large rear dormer executed in brick, which serves as an enclosure for the attic staircase. Located to each side of brick gable are round roofed dormers fitted with casement style windows.

The interior is divided by a wide center hall with a large parlor to the south and dining room and kitchen to the north. The center hall features an elaborate Colonial Revival staircase featuring a spiral end to the turned baluster railing. The stringer to the staircase features a scroll decoration, and the area beneath the stringer is finished with raised panels. As the stair rises to the second floor landing, the handrail ramps before each post. The room is fitted with intricate cornice and baseboard moldings.

A generous double width door opening provides access to the parlor on the south side of the center hall. Dominating the fireplace wall is a neoclassical mantel featuring paired colonettes to each side of the firebox. The colonettes rise to a decorated frieze with pairs of end block embellished with carved oval medallions. The center

tablet features intricate carving as well with a torch and vine design. The broken profile mantel shelf is enriched with a dentil bed molding. The parlor is also defined by panel moldings which outline large rectangular blocks on each wall. Stretching around the perimeter of the roof are elaborate cornice and baseboard moldings. The dining room, located on the north side of the hall, is a smaller space with a less elaborate mantel. The dining room mantel has panels which enhance the pilasters and frieze. A narrow board oak floor enhances the dining room and extends into the adjacent library, housed in the north wing. A row of bookshelves defines one wall. The library is also enhanced with a plaster cornice molding.

Located west of the library is a small butler's pantry converted to a breakfast room by the current owner. The pantry is entered through a swinging five-panel door, and the space is fitted with a built-in storage cabinet. A tiled bathroom is located off the pantry.

The kitchen, located behind the dining room and adjacent to the pantry, has been reworked to serve modern needs. A narrow service stair rises in the south end of the room as well as providing access to the full cellar.

The second floor is divided into four principal bedrooms with two bathrooms featuring tiled floors and walls as well as early twentieth century fixtures. Five-panel doors framed by molded surrounds open into the various bedrooms. Most of the original brass hardware remains intact on the bedroom doors. The third floor is finished as well with a range of bedrooms around a centrally located bathroom.

The only early twentieth century outbuilding is a story-and-a-half Flemish bond garage that stands on the southwest corner of the lot. The double garage bay brick structure is covered by a gambrel roof sheathed in slate. The east side of the roof is defined by a shed roofed dormer featuring casement windows. The north gable end of the garage is distinguished by a half-round window that lights the second floor.


