Located along Snow Hill Road southeast of Salisbury, the Alexander G. Malone farmhouse stands out as a distinctive landmark with its intact Victorian façade and unusual cobelled cap chimneys with inset paneled sides. Also important to the cross-gabled, five-bay front is the original turned post porch, which features a spindle decorated eave enriched further with decorated rafter ends. Dating around 1892, the main block extends to the back with a two-story, two-room plan service wing that has a decorative turned post porch as well. Predating the tee-shaped main house is a single-story, one-room plan summer kitchen, which is attached to the service wing by means of a single-story hyphen. The summer kitchen is distinctly different from the main block with its mid nineteenth century boxed cornices and flush gable ends. The summer kitchen dates around 1850. Joining the house on the property is a late nineteenth-century frame barn.

The distinctive late nineteenth-century features of the Victorian farmhouse indicate that it was erected for Alexander G. Malone after he acquired 120 acres, known variously as “Nevan’s Addition” or “Long Acre,” in August 1891. Alexander G. Malone purchased the property from Emily V. Phillips, who had purchased the farm in 1868 from John and Margaret A. Pollitt. In the 1868 transfer the land is described as previously owned by “George Parsons of Jordon, late of Worcester County.” Alexander G. Malone retained title to this property until his death. His executor, Roger Malone, conveyed title of the farm to Alexander G., Mabel F., and Cordelia Frances Malone in 1941. The farmstead remains in family hands.

The Alexander G. Malone farm is located at 4943 Snow Hill Road southeast of Salisbury, Wicomico County, Maryland. The two-and-a-half story, five-bay frame house faces southwest with the principal gable oriented on a northwest/southeast axis. The house is joined on the farm by a single-story frame barn. Supported on an in-filled brick foundation, the main house is sheathed with asbestos shingles, and the roof is covered with asphalt shingles.

Comprised of two different sections of distinctly different age, the main two-and-a-half story, five-bay, center hall frame dwelling with a two-story, two-room plan service wing was erected around 1892, whereas a single-story, one room plan summer kitchen, attached by a single-story hyphen, dates from the mid nineteenth century. The southwest (main) elevation of the house is a symmetrical five-bay façade with a center entrance and flanking two-over-two sash windows. The six-panel front door is topped by a two-light transom. The windows are flanked by louvered vinyl shutters. Sheltering the center three bays of the front is a turned post hip roofed porch enriched with spindle eave decoration. The edge of the porch roof has an extended eave with exposed and decorated rafter ends. The second story is defined by an evenly spaced row of two-over-two sash windows flanked by louvered vinyl shutters. Centered on the roof is a cross gable pierced with a smaller sized two-over-two sash window. The edge of the roof has an extended eave with decorated bargeboards, an open soffit and pierced sawnwork brackets at the lower corners. Piercing the roofline is a pair of brick chimneys features inset panel sides and corbelled caps.

The northwest and southeast gable ends are largely alike with a single two-over-two sash window lighting each floor including the attic. The edge of the roof extends beyond the wall surface and the bargeboard has a subtle surface decoration.

The northeast (rear) wall of the main block is largely covered by the two-story, four-bay, two-room plan service wing which dates from the same time as the front block. An identical corbelled cap chimney with inset panel sides pierces the center of the roof, which features exposed and decorated rafter ends as well as sawnwork brackets at the lower corners. Two-over-two sash windows light the first and second stories. Attached to the southeast side is a single-story shed roof porch supported on turned posts and featuring spindle decoration under the eave. Extending from the northwest side of the kitchen wing is an early twentieth century single story, one bay hyphen, which joins the older single-story summer kitchen.

The summer kitchen is a slightly taller single-story, one-room plan structure sheathed with asbestos shingles and covered by a medium pitched asphalt shingle roof. The edges of the roof, unlike the main block, are finished with a boxed cornices and flush gable ends. The gable end is trimmed with a mid nineteenth-century molded bargeboard. The summer kitchen is lighted by six-over-six sash windows in addition to a six-pane window in the southeast gable end. Piercing the north gable is a single flue concrete block stack which serves the furnace.

Standing southeast of the house is a single-story gable front barn supported on a minimal brick foundation and covered with vertical boards. The gable front center section is flanked by shed roofed sections to the north and south sides.

The interior of the house was not seen.


